

Miller Huggins Triumphed Over John M'Graw Yesterday by Score 4-2

YANKS TURN THE TABLES ON GIANTS YESTERDAY, DEFEATING THEM FOUR-TWO

Battering Babe, the Sultan of Swat, Has at Last Hit His Home Run Stride By Lining Two Circuit Clouts Into the Left and Right Field Stands of the Polo Grounds—Ward, His Team-mate Also Poled a Homer—Three Home Runs and a Single Made "Jawn" Look Sick.

(Canadian Press) NEW YORK, Oct. 11.—Babe Ruth tossed with a mighty tread today, the threshold of the world's series that has been barred to him for two years. Driving out two underling home runs thrusts in successive innings a feat unparalleled in championship baseball history. Ruth was the Dynamo in the powerful attack that enabled the New York Yankees to turn the tables on Giants and capture the second game of the series by a score of four to two. First up in the fourth inning, with the score tied at one all, the great slugger put the Yanks into the lead with a terrific towering blow that landed atop of the second tier of the right field grandstand, and started the downfall of Hugh McQuillan, the giant's ace. Another run was scored in that same inning, but on the next turn at the bat in the fifth, "Babe" crashed one of Jack Bentley's southpaw slants to the corner of the right field stand. That blow was climax of the game. The Yankee victory was clinched, and it proved merely a formality to carry on to the finish. It was a spectacular triumph, for the Yankee's worse punch mangled John McGraw's strategy. It was brilliant day for Herb Pennock, fragile left hander, who

"BABE" LIKES THE POLO GROUNDS

(Canadian Press) NEW YORK, Polo Grounds, Oct. 11.—After driving two home runs in the right and left field stands here today during the Yankee Giants game, Babe Ruth opined that he would have hit at least 80 home runs if the Huggens hadn't moved into their own stadium this season. "Gee, but this is an easy park to hit homers in," declared the Babe. "You don't know how easy it is until you've been away for a year. That left field stand is a cinch compared to the Yankee Stadium. Only a pop fly, and the ball's in. I'd have hit 80 homers easily here." Inasmuch as the Babe hit 59 homers on the same field two years ago, he must believe that the season just ended was the best he ever had. If he hit only 41 at the "Yankees" park and would have driven out 80 at the Giants' playground, then it must be twice as hard to get homers on one field as on the other.

POLOGROUNDS, Oct. 11.—Babe Ruth, yept the whale and came to the surface into the World's Series today and spouted; he flushed two home runs into the left field stands, and that with two other runs, one a circuit drive by the blackhaired Ward, was enough to sink the giants.
