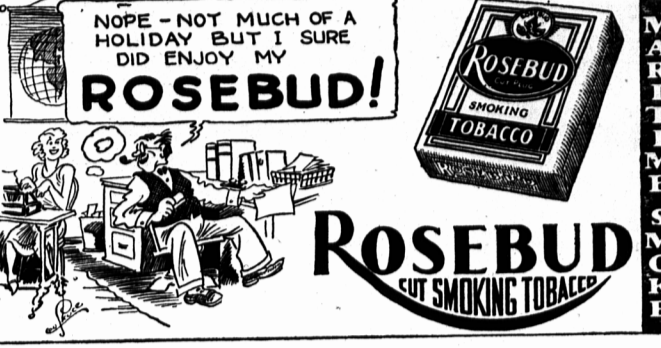

First White Woman Born in B. C. is Dead

VANCOUVER, Sept. 7.—Mrs. Emma Snider, 81, believed to have been the first white girl born in British Columbia, is dead here. She was born in 1853, two years after her parents, Richard Cheesman, an officer of the Hudson's Bay Company, and his wife, Ann, came to Vancouver Island, and started the settlement of Royal Oak, now a suburb of Victoria. She lived in British Columbia all her life, coming here from Victoria with her husband, W. H. Snider, in 1914. Mr. Snider died some years ago.
