Will Exterminate Leprosy, Says Eminent Scientist (Associated Press.) CHICAGO, Aug. 29.—Soap is the greatest enemy of leprosy and if economic conditions could be changed so that everyone could afford to be clean, and education create in them the desire and knowledge of hygiene, leprosy would soon cease to be a great scourge and become one of the rare diseases.

CHICAGO, Aug. 29.—Soap is the greatest enemy of leprosy and if economic conditions could be changed so that everyone could afford to be clean, and education create in them the desire and knowledge of hygiene, leprosy would soon cease to be a great scourge and become one of the rare diseases. Dr. Arthur W. Stillians, professor of dermatology at Northwestern University, announced in an article just published.

The author arrives at the conclusion that to eradicate leprosy in this country the first object of the attack must be on the popular fear of the disease. "It seems the great difficulty in the isolation of lepers in the United States is finding them, their fear of being branded as lepers being so great that those who suspect the nature of their disease will hide, at any sacrifice, rather than come into the open," says Dr. Stillians. "As for the victims of the malady, occupational therapy is of benefit, it has been found. Kindness and encouragement put hope into their hearts and their condition improves as a consequence. Because leprosy in its early stages is not recognizable in part of entry examinations of immigrants, the problem of its control is a problem for the whole world."

IN MEMORIAM

THE LATE REV. R. S. WHIDDEN (Truro News)

Rev. R. S. Whidden, pastor of the Congregation of Kennebec, Gore and Five Mile River, Hants Co., passed away with awful suddenness on Saturday evening, Aug. 18th at the home of Mrs. Theodore Forbes, Five Mile River to which section of his field he had gone on Friday to visit his parishioners there and conduct his regular service on Sabbath morning. He had complained during the day of feeling unwell but no one considered his condition serious. He remained in his rooms most of the time. After supper he retired and when he did not come down stairs, at dark some one went to his room and was greatly shocked to find that he had passed away evidently in sleep. He was lying on his bed when found, his glasses on and one of his sermons he had prepared for the Sabbath services in his hand, fully written out.

The deceased for eight years ministered to the congregation of North Bedoune, P. E. Island. Mr. Whidden's appointments on Sabbath were taken by Rev. C. D. Macintosh of River John, a former pastor who was spending part of his vacation at Kennebec. He made use of the sermon manuscripts Mr. Whidden had prepared and delivered to the people at Five Mile River and the Gore the messages their late pastor had intended for them. These messages delivered under such unusual conditions made a profound impression upon all. The text for the morning was "Blessed are the pure in heart for they shall see God," and for the afternoon "Thou art the Christ the Son of the Living God." A short service was held at the house on Monday afternoon Mr. Macintosh leading in prayer. At the church which was filled to capacity by people from all parts of the Congregation the service was conducted by members of Presbyterian Rev. H. M. Upham of Shubenacadie, W. S. Irving of Clifton, C. D. Macintosh of River John; Dr. Quigley of Maitland and J. F. McKay of Millford.

Mr. Whidden had served the congregation for fifteen months by appointment more than a year ago. Then he went west for a time, while there a great sorrow came to his home in the accidental death of a favorite son. He returned to Nova Scotia last fall and on July 26th, last was inducted into the Congregation. He and Mrs. Whidden were highly respected and greatly loved by their people. THROUGH THE MARITIMES WITH THE C. W. N. ASSOCIATION

The following is taken from the "Pictou Gazette" Pictou, Ontario, relating the impressions of a correspondent of that paper while on a sight seeing tour in the "Garden of the Gulf."

Back Fox Farming

Within the last ten years Prince Edward Island has come in for world wide fame on account of its fox farming industry and particularly for its silver black animals. Prince County is the center of the industry, where but a few years ago there were only three men who were classed as experts in respect thereto. Today there are 566 ranches on the Island, 401 of which are in Prince County. The number of foxes in each ranch runs all the way from ten to one hundred, and in a few instances even higher. The pens are located in well wooded groves and surrounded with special wire fencing. In weight the animals run from eight to fifteen pounds, and in color from light silver to jet black. For breeding purposes as high as \$30,000 a pair was obtained in the early days of the industry, while as high as \$2,628.98 has been secured for a single pelt, the highest figure ever paid on any fur market. Several ranch owners have made fortunes out of their enterprise and practically all established companies are paying dividends, running in some instances to 15 per cent. The animal value of the fur farms of the province is estimated at about two million dollars.

Summerside

Summerside is about forty-eight miles from the capital and is the second largest town on the Island. It has excellent stores, handsome residences, and much to attract the summer visitor. Among its business ramifications extend over the Maritime Provinces and whose turnover runs into several million dollars a year. It is also the center of the Island's famous fur farming industry the headquarters of the Prince Fox Breeders' Association, being located there. Summerside fronts on a bay on the south side of the Island, and is delightfully situated. From a hill in the rear of the town a glorious view of the country and of the waters north and south is obtained. To the north can be seen Bedoune Bay and the Gulf of St. Lawrence and its attractive surroundings; to the south is Northumberland Strait with the New Brunswick coast line in the distance.

Arriving in Summerside about 10 o'clock Friday we were at once driven to see some of the many black fox ranches of which there are numbers within a short distance of the town. The foxes are kept in wire enclosures some fifteen feet square with small wooden houses in the centre of the enclosure. The wire netting goes three feet below the surface of the ground and is turned in at the bottom for a couple of feet to prevent the foxes from burrowing under the fence. The sides are about 8 feet high with the wire projecting inside for about 3 feet at the top to keep them from climbing out.

Last winter there was such a heavy snowfall on the Island that the pens were filled with snow, many of the foxes escaping with heavy loss to the owners. This has resulted in the newer pens being constructed on a different plan this year. They are now being built eight sided with a centre post and rafters supporting wire netting over the entire pen.

The foxes looked rough at the time of our visit as they were shedding their winter coats and did not appear to the advantage that they would a few months later with their new winter fur on. The litters range from two to eight. Many young pups of five or six handsome fox families from three to eight weeks old were seen, the keeper catching some of them for the observation of the visitors. At twelve noon dinner was served at the Britannia Club rooms, by the Ladies Aid of the Prince County Hospital. The President of the Board of Trade, the Mayor, Mr. A. C. Saunders on behalf of Premier Bell and Mr. J. D. Stewart, Provincial Conservative leader, now the newly elected Premier, gave addresses of welcome. Rev. A. H. Moore of St. Johns, Quebec and other speakers replying.

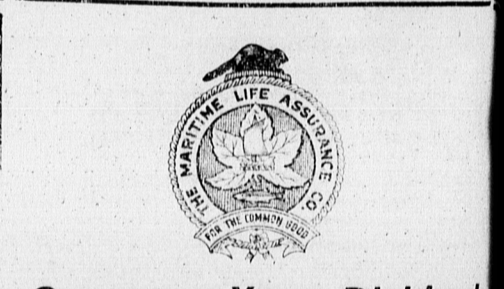
