The demand for silvers in medium shades is brisk and good prices are realized. Blacks also, if extra well furred command good prices. Pure silver skins are not so much in demand, while silvers with brownish tinge are not wanted. The more desirable shades are quarter silvers and these when well furred demand fancy prices. Reds although much sought for at the first of the season are somewhat less in demand, an extra red will bring about \$25. Crosses appear to be plentiful and not as much in demand during the first of the season. Silver crosses are desirable, but crosses without much appearance of red. Muskrat is bringing high prices and is generally taking the place of the high class fur seals in the manufacturing trade. Good muskrat is dressed into a very good imitation of seal and when made into garments goes on the market as Hudson seal. The genuine fur seal is no much sought for as the muskrat makes a good imitation and is much cheaper although single skins bring as high as \$1.50. Ermine, or what is known here as weasel, is also in strong demand single skins bringing about \$1.00.

PLATOON FOR CHARLOTTE TOWN.—Recently instructions were given for this province to send recruits for garrison duty in Halifax and representations were made that the province was entitled to retain a proportion of the men here. As a result permission has been granted for a platoon to be retained here including one lieutenant, two sergeants, three corporals and a total of 31 men. It is probable that Lieut. McCarthy, M. C. will be in command.

In loving memory of Eliza McIntyre of Picton, N. S. who departed this life January 9th, 1918. The deceased was sixty-seven years of age, and had only come over a short time ago to spend the winter with her niece Mrs. D.A. Smith, when she was stricken with heart failure and although all that medical skill could do she passed away. Miss McIntyre was a woman of the finest christian character being a constant member of the Presbyterian Church at Picton and no doubt will be missed. She leaves to mourn one sister Mrs. M. B. McNair now residing in the United States and many friends who will mourn her. Her funeral was held on Monday the sixth, the services being conducted by the Rev. D. McLean. Her remains were conveyed to Highfield Cemetery where she was buried by the side of her brother.

RETURNED SOLDIER'S COMMITTEE.—A meeting of the Returned Soldier's Committee was held in the Provincial Building Monday when the different sub-committees reported on the organization throughout the province. It was intimated that the Secretary of the Land Settlement Board intends to visit the province at an early date and open an office here. As soon as this is done publicity will be given to the proposals of the Government with reference to the settlement of returned soldiers on the land. Additional legislation making the terms of borrowing more favourable than hitherto will be introduced at the next session of the legislature.

The many friends of Mr. Charles Chandler, of this city are pleased to see him back again from his trip to England where he had gone to visit his son, Sapper Russel Chandler who is in Granville Hospital near Buxton. Mr. Chandler sailed from Halifax by the Olympic on Dec. 21st and returned by the Minnedosa which left Liverpool Sunday, Jan. 19 at noon and arrived at St. John on Sunday night the 26th after a rather rough trip. Among those who came over were 50 members of the R. A. F. also the Marquis of Queensbury and other notables.

The only other Islander he met on board was Capt. Henry, a flyer of Edmonton, whose father was Mayor of that town last year and is a native of Charlottetown.

Mr. Chandler found it a very difficult matter to secure lodging in London and says the population today is ten millions.

He expects that his son who was wounded in the leg at the Arras-Cambrai Road on Sept. 9th last and subsequently lost his leg, will leave for home in a couple of months. It is pleasing to know that he is now making a good recovery. Sapper Chandler was with the Canadian Divisional Signallers when he received his wounds.

LIVERPOOL, N. S., January 24.—Agnes, wife of the Rev. H. L. Haslam, rector of this parish, died here at the rectory this afternoon after many months of severe suffering, borne with true patience. She was born at Lunenburg forty years ago, a daughter, of the late Sheriff Joseph Creighton and leaves of that family her mother, two sisters, Mrs. A. R. Leslie of London, and Mrs. C. W. L. Stanford of Chester, and the present Sheriff of Lunenburg. She was of strong literary tastes and gave many valuable contributions to the public. Ten years ago last summer she was married to Mr. Haslam at St. John's Anglican Church, Lunenburg, and came at once here to reside. Two children, Dorothea and Gerald, are left with a bereaved father upon whom an abundance of sympathy is being poured. Interment will be made here on Monday afternoon in the churchyard beside Trinity Church. The Chronicle says:—The news of Mrs. Haslam's death will be heard with great sorrow and sympathy by a large number of friends and acquaintances. She was well known in the Counties of Queens and Lunenburg, and also in other parts of the Province, for her charming personality, keenness of intellect and beauty of character. Mrs. Haslam was the eldest daughter of the late Sheriff Creighton of Lunenburg, in which town her girlhood was spent, and where she endeared herself to many. She was active in literary and social circles and took a leading part in church work in her native town. On her removal at the time of her marriage, to Liverpool, she made a great many friends, and turned her enthusiasm to a number of interests. She instituted, among other things, a club for the betterment of life among
