### SOMETHING ABOUT CAPE COLONY.

The prolonged troubles in South Africa have had the effect of drawing increased attention to Cape Colony, the great British dependency which occupies the position of neighbor to the Transvaal and the Orange Free State. Sir Richard Cartwright in the monthly report for July of his department has printed extensive statistics of the trade of The Cape, as it is called, from which report and from other sources the following information is compiled.

Cape Colony, after being abandoned by the Dutch East India Company was occupied by the British in 1795. It was restored to the Dutch in 1802, but regained by the British in 1806. Its area is now about 221,311 square miles and its population in 1891 was 1,527,224. About 75 per cent of the population is made up of Hottentots, Kafirs and Malays, the remainder being of English, Dutch and French descent. But the English-speaking population has grown greatly since 1891.

It is surprising to read that so limited a white population has developed a trade which is equal to two thirds of the trade of Canada. In 1898 Cape Colony's import trade was \$81,187,865, and her export trade \$123,217,678, making a grand total of \$204,405,543. In six years past the volume of trade has more than doubled. It will be seen from these figures that The Cape as well as Canada is enjoying a growing time at present.

Two thirds of the imports are from Great Britain and a still larger proportion of the exports go thither, showing how valuable the commerce of the Colony is to the Mother Country. A large share of the export trade is in gold and precious stones. The gold bullion exported in 1898 made a total of nearly \$75,000,000, while precious stones, mainly diamonds, added \$22,225,000. Wool is the next largest export, with ostrich feathers and Angora hair each ranking above three millions. The export of gold has increased from about four millions to its present great proportions in the past ten years.

As yet the trade of Canada with the Cape is comparatively insignificant. We bought last year in the Colony \$17,962 worth and sold there only the value of \$6,233. And yet there is an excellent market at the Cape for agricultural implements, wheat, flour, cotton goods, leather manufactures and machinery in which Canada might profitably compete.

The other day a young man named Ludger Tardiff appeared at the business counter of La Presse newspaper, Montreal and wrote out a death notice, giving his own name as that of the party who had died, and adding the words, "Funeral Private." When

questioned he said he was then on his way to drown himself. The police were notified by telephone and the young man was arrested on the river bank, apparently intending to make good the notice he had left for publication. The Magistrate gave him a severe lecture and he decided to put off his private funeral to a future time.

United States official returns for the year ended 1st of July last, show that nearly half the trade of the Republic was with the British empire and its dependencies. The following table gives the figures of the imports and exports respectively by the Republic with British countries and all other countries respectively:

### THE ARMY WORM.

Appeared at Kirklaw, Bay View.—A Specimen of the Dreaded "Army Worm."

(Leucania unipuncta), was found today in our potato field, and, as it is a terrible scourge when it once gets started, I thought best to call the attention to the fact that it is here, and also describe it so that it may be known and destroyed as soon as seen.

The Larva is a green worm about one and a quarter inches long with three yellowish bands running along the back from end to end, there are three pairs of "claw legs" near the head, four pairs of true legs under the abdomen, and one pair at the extremity. The specimen before me is very stupid, and harmless looking; but, during the summer of '94 and '96 armies of them did great damage in parts of Ontario, not to speak of the wholesale scourge they have been to large tracts of country in the United States. They prefer to feed upon wheat, oats, grass, etc. and rarely injure the root crops, though my specimen is now at ten o'clock at night, munching a potato-top in his glass cell. If we should not succeed in destroying the few pioneers, it will be necessary to resort to one or more of the following remedies:—

Spray the edge of field or farm toward which the army is moving, or, if they have begun work, spray in advance with an ordinary solution of Paris Green. Plow a furrow between the field and the approaching worms, and have the perpendicular side next the crop. As the worms advance they may be destroyed by thousands before they get out of the furrow.

Form windrows of straw, which may be burned when the worms get into them.

Form windrows of cut green feed and saturate with Paris Green (one pound to 75 gallons of water).

Burn all infested pastures and meadows in Spring and Fall, in order to destroy the insect, while in the pupa stage. I sincerely hope that we will destroy the ones and twos, as they appear, and not have to resort to these remedies.
