PARIS, May 22.—The French Cabinet at a meeting today approved preliminary measures of Finance Minister Caillaux for balancing of the budget. Details were not revealed but it is understood plans include the levying of additional taxation and withdrawal of receipts from Germany under the Dawes plan payment, from the budget, so that part can be devoted to the payment of inter-aliated debts.

Revised Table Of Precedence In Canada

In view of the many official functions likely to be given this season it will be interesting to know the official order of precedence as recently revised. Following is the official list revised and published Dec. 3, 1923.

- 1. The Governor General or Officer administering the Government.
2. The Lieutenant-Governor of Ontario.
3. The Lieutenant-Governor of Quebec.
4. The Lieutenant-Governor of Nova Scotia.
5. The Lieutenant-Governor of New Brunswick.
6. The Lieutenant-Governor of Manitoba.
7. The Lieutenant-Governor of British Columbia.
8. The Lieutenant-Governor of Prince Edward Island.
9. The Lieutenant-Governor of Saskatchewan.
10. The Lieutenant-Governor of Alberta.
11. The Prime Minister of Canada.
12. Archbishops and Bishops according to seniority.
13. The Moderator of the Presbyterian Church in Canada, the General Superintendent of the Methodist Church in Canada and the corresponding head of the Baptist Church in Canada.
14. Members of the Cabinet according to seniority.
15. The Chief Justice of Canada.
16. Members of the Privy Council not of the Cabinet according to seniority.
17. The Speaker of the Senate.
18. The Speaker of the House of Commons.
19. The Prime Ministers of the Provinces of Canada.
20. The Chief Judges of the Courts of Law and Equity according to seniority and the Judge appointed to perform the duties of the Chief Justice at Quebec and Montreal.
21. The Puisne Judges of the Supreme Court of Canada according to seniority.
22. Judges of the Exchequer Court of Canada.
23. The Solicitor General of Canada.
24. Members of the Senate.
25. Puisne Judges of the Courts of Law and Equity and of the Exchequer Court, according to seniority.
26. Members of the House of Commons.
27. The Chief of Staff National Defence and the Director of Naval Services and the Director of the Air Force provided they are of the rank of Major-General or its equivalent or higher rank.
28. Members of the Executive Council, Provincial within their Province.
29. The Speaker of the Legislative Council within his Province.
30. Members of the Legislative Council within their Province.
31. The Speaker of the Legislative Assembly within his Province.
32. Members of the Legislative Assembly within their Province.
NOTE.—Judges at present on the retired list and Judges at present holding Office but who shall retire after the date of the New Table shall not be affected as to Precedence given to them by the Old Table.

In the revised table the designation of places for the Lieutenant-Governors of Saskatchewan and Alberta (9 and 10) are new; so are the place of the Prime Minister of Canada; section 13, according to places to "The Moderator of the Presbyterian Church in Canada, the General Superintendent of the Methodist Church in Canada, and the corresponding head of the Baptist Church in Canada;" section 19, providing for the Prime Ministers of the Provinces of Canada; the concluding clause of section 20, providing for the Judges appointed to perform the duties of Chief Justice of Quebec and Montreal, section 27, providing for the Chief of Staff National Defence, the Director of Naval Services and the Director of the Air Force provided they are of the rank of Major-General or its equivalent or higher rank. The Speaker and members of the House of Commons are given relatively higher place than accorded to them in the old list.

The following items in the old list disappear altogether in the revised one: 2. The Senior Officer Commanding His Majesty's Troops within the Dominion, if of the rank of a commanding officer. His Majesty's Naval Forces on the B. N. A. Station if their own relative rank is determined by the King's Regulations on the subject. 10. The Lieutenant-Governor of the North West Territories. 18. The Controller of Customs. 19. The Controller of Inland Revenue. 20. General Officers of His Majesty's Army serving in the Dominion, and Officers of His Majesty's Army serving in the Dominion, and Officers of the rank of Admiral in the Royal Navy serving on the B. N. A. Station, not being in the chief command. The relative rank of such officers to be determined by the King's Regulations. 21. The Chief Officer commanding His Majesty's troops in the Dominion, if of the rank of Colonel or inferior rank, and the Officer commanding His Majesty's Naval Forces on the B. N. A. Station, if of equivalent rank. Their relative rank to be ascertained by the King's Regulations.

An important feature of the revised table is the omission of any reference to Imperial Privy Counsellors. Since 1902 it had been the practice, with the sanction of the Governor-General, to accord certain precedence to Imperial Privy Counsellors; and the omission of reference to such officers in the revised list has been taken as an indication that the practice mentioned

EASTERN STARS NOSE ANCHORS OUT, SCORE 6-5

Upwards of 900 Enthusiastic Fans Witness Thrilling Finish In Second City League Fixture.

After successfully overcoming a 4 to 1 lead and going into the seventh innings on the long end of the scoring, the Anchors, Bill Ryan's fighting crew from the West, were forced to swallow the proverbial "bitter pill" last evening at the hands, or rather by the bludgeons, of the Eastern Stars, when they nosed their opponents out in the "ol' lucky event" by negotiating two trips over the platter and clinching the issue by a score of 6 to 5.

It was a thrilling finish to a most exciting game which had upwards of 900 fans on their toes throughout its entire length. The story can be briefly told. The Stars got the jump in the first frame, battling three runs over before being turned back. From then to the sixth the game was airtight with McFarlane and McQuaid hurling great ball for their respective teams. Despite the airtight showing a break seemed to be in the air and at the first of the sixth arrived. The Anchors, with two men on and nobody down made the best of a good thing and before the half finished pushed four tallies over, tying the score amidst wildest cheering from the West End rooters.

After the more or less bewildering sixth the Stars settled down to "play ball" but the Anchors were doing likewise with the result that the Eastern Stars went into the seventh one run behind. It was a fighting finish—with two on and a passed ball. The climax was reached when Ed. Lynds came through with a smashing single through short sending the winning run over. The game went into the eighth but was called on account of darkness. "Lefty" McQuaid the Eastern Star moundsman "was on" last evening and never pitched a more heady game in his young life. He had "whiz" to burn and his control was perfect to say the least, so McQuaid probably set a pitching record for this season as he had.

Official rank and position, although conferring special official precedence on the holder of the office as per the Table of Precedence does not do so any more in Canada than in the Mother Country, upon the holder's wife and children. Thus the wives and children of the Privy Counsellors, Senators, Judges, members of Parliament, and officers of state as such, have no special precedence, except such as accorded to them (and it is always done) as a compliment. Widows of Privy Counsellors, Senators, Judges or public officials, have no claim to complimentary precedence as such, any claim they might have had in this respect lapsing with demise of their husbands. Knightly titles or other Imperial titles and appointments do not entitle the holders to any recognition under the Official Table of Precedence for Canada. This is a fact which is often overlooked by those in charge of semi-official and popular ceremonial events, and gentlemen entitled to precedence in Canada by the official table sanctioned by the Sovereign, often find themselves ignored in favor of others having no claim whatever to precedence in Canada although they may be entitled to recognize places in the Mother Country or other parts of the Empire. Members of the Royal Family while in Canada take precedence next after the Governor-General, this according to a rule in effect throughout His Majesty's Dominions.

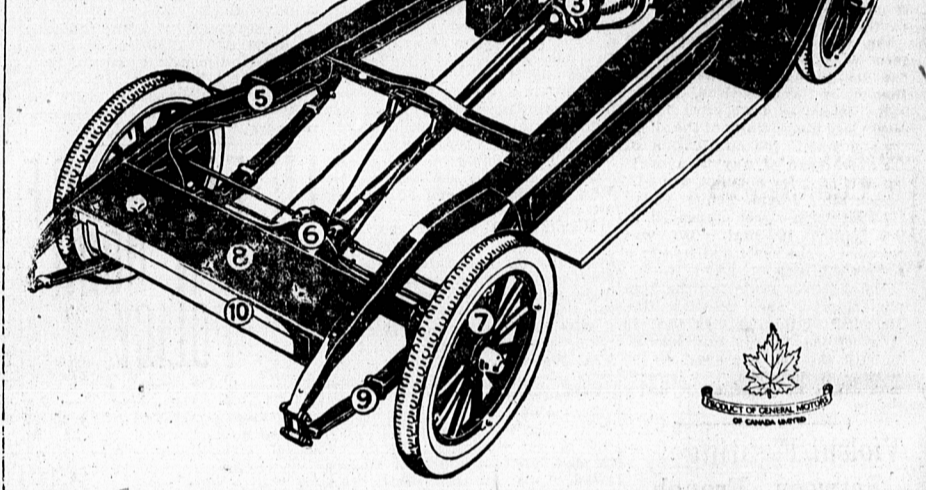
