Unearth Skull of Ancient Londoner LONDON, Oct. 22-Part of a fossil human skull discovered in deep excavation on Leaden Hill, London, may in the opinion of archaeologists rank in importance with the Neanderthal and Piltdown cranial shells. It was found at a depth of twenty-six feet, and according to Professor Elliot Smith, probably belonged to a woman of about fifty years of age. The right side of the brain cavity, which is very small is less developed than the left side, indicating that the woman was left handed. It is much nearer the Neanderthal skull than that of the present day human being, and Professor Smith says that if it is not of the Neanderthal period, it certainly is of a much more primitive period than that of the Palaeolithic. Another anthropologist says the skull, which is much flattened, seems to show that this ancient Londoner lived in the Upper Palaeolithic period.

For Traffic Cops MANCHESTER, Oct. 22-England's traffic policemen shortly may become illuminated semaphores at night. A Manchester engineer has invented a phosphorescent arrow for directors of traffic at street corners. The shaft is strapped on the wearer's wrist. It contains one light of vivid green and another of ruby red.

Fog Delays Hunt NELSON, B. C., Oct. 22-Fog enveloping the mountainous country between Creston and the United States boundary today was hindering the man hunt for one of the two bandits who held up the Imperial Bank of Canada there yesterday and obtained \$6,500 accord-

ing to a telephone message received here by Sergeant Ernest Gammon of the Provincial Police. One man captured with \$700 of the loot in his possession is held at Creston.

Former Kaiser's Wife Wins Suit STUTTGART, Germany, Oct. 22-Efforts by republican guards to begin proceedings against Princess Hermine, wife of former Emperor William, for alleged unlawful usurpation of the title "Kaiserin Hermine" have failed. An attempt to lodge a criminal complaint against her under the penal code was made at Arnburg, but the court there passed the allegations along to another court which declined to present the charge to the district attorney. Likewise the public prosecutor would not take any action. It was charged that Hermine designated herself as "Wife of His Majesty William II, former Emperor." Also it was alleged that she was registered in the list of visitors to the Spa at Wildbad as "Empress and Queen" and that a local photographer issued picture postcards of her with the words "Kaiserin Hermine in Wildbad, 1925," on them.
