THE INCOME TAX

The Winnipeg Free Press (Liberal) has analyzed the Dominion Income Tax schedules as compared with corresponding schedules in the United Kingdom and the result is both interesting and instructive. We quote:

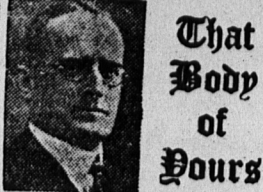

YOUR THYROID GLAND DETERMINES YOUR APPEARANCE

"Have you too much activity of the thyroid gland in the neck?" "Then the fires of life burn too fast and easily, the mind is too active in receiving impressions and meets life's troubles more than half way, as shown by the staring eyes, the trembling hands, and the palpitating heart."

It is gratifying to know that by removing any infective condition, and by mental and physical rest, most of these thyroid conditions can be cured.

Progress the British Way

A report in the New York Times that Lord Amulree's Commission has recommended placing Newfoundland's finances under expert non-political control pending inauguration of a complete reconstruction plan is described as premature by Sir William Stavert, who was a member of the Commission, along with Hon. Charles A. Magrath of Ottawa. It serves, nevertheless, to call attention to the elasticity of modern British policy and its contradiction of what is usually regarded as rigid adherence to tradition.

But Mr. King is not content with this one warning. He is concerned lest the electors give their support to what he is pleased to describe as Tory autocracy, which is little worse in his opinion than C.C.F. bureaucracy.

Neither these calls for assistance nor recognition of the value of the Privy Council as an appeal court is an affront to local talent, but acknowledgment of a range of experience possible only in a country which for generations has had many and varied problems to meet.

The Dominions are fortunate in being able to call upon the experience thus gained with important problems directly or indirectly, together with that obtained in connection with the domestic and world problems of the United Kingdom. It is certain that if the Amulree Commission recommends a step backward for Newfoundland it will be for the purpose of getting a new and permanent step forward.
