CANADA'S UNSOLVED MYSTERIES

DEATH OF BESSIE PERRI

HAMILTON, Jan. 8—The night of Aug. 15, 1930, provided the police with one of the most perplexing murder cases in the annals of Canadian crime—a case which still remains unsolved.

On that night, Mrs. Bessie Perri was shot and instantly killed at the rear of her palatial Bay Street residence here. Wife of the picturesque, powerful and so-called "king of the bootleggers," Rocco Perri, she was shot down between the garage and back door of her home just after the couple had returned from a party. Whether the bullets were intended for Rocco Perri too has never been determined. He escaped without a scratch.

Two persons, possibly three, are believed to have hidden about the garage at the rear of the home the Perri acquired some years previously. A barrage from the double-barrelled shotguns was played on the door through which they were to enter the house. Both guns were found nearby. Revolver bullets were discovered embedded in wood in the line of fire.

Three men were seen running from the scene following the shooting. They fled in a car that had been parked nearby, but it was too dark for identification of the car or its occupants.

There was no robbery despite the fact Mrs. Perri was wearing thousands of dollars worth of jewels at the time of the shooting. It was suggested the unfortunate woman had been "put on the spot" for some real or fancied grievance of the past. The crime had the earmarks of a gangster plot.

Crowds of morbidly curious gathered in the cemetery for burial of Bessie Perri. Relatives fainted and women screamed. Feeling ran high but the presence of police held the situation in control.

Perri offered \$5,000 reward for apprehension of the slavers. The city of Hamilton added \$1,000. Still there has been no tangible clue.
