 MONTREAL, April 18.—An illicit still said by officers to be capable of turning out about 1,000 gallons alcohol a day was seized by customs officers here. Two men, James Comstock, 23, and Jack Miller, described as hired help, were arrested and arraigned before Judge Enright. They pleaded not guilty of being in possession of an illicit still. Ball was set at \$2,000 each and the trial on April 24. The still, a modern affair, was installed in a building on Gray Nun Street, a stone's throw from the dominion customs offices on McGill Street, near the waterfront.

FREDERICTON, N. B. April 19.—Once again New Brunswick Women's Institutes are preparing fall fairs, which are held in the cities of their province. This year the Institutes are asked to get ready the following exhibits: a set of men's mittens and over sock, double knitted in fancy patterns; a linen luncheon set, cloth at least one year square, and at least four serviettes to match; a patch work quilt.

There are two classes for Junior Institutes and \$25 is to be distributed for these. The classes are hand embroidered runner and a practical work apron. Several members have volunteered to open exchanges, where hand work is sold, during the coming summer.

In Memoriam
 MRS. DAMAS RICHARD

The death occurred at the home of her sister Mrs. J. H. Blanchard, 114 Upper Prince Street, on Saturday morning, March 30th, of Mrs. Damas Richard in the 40th year of her age.

The deceased who had been in failing health for nearly a year, in September last entered the Prince County Hospital where she underwent a serious operation from which she never completely recovered. Complications set in and despite all that medical skill and careful nursing could do, she gradually sank until the end.

The late Mrs. Richard before her marriage had taught in the public schools of the province for several years. In this occupation she had been very successful and had made many friends. Aviation Course Open To Canada

BOSTON, April 19.—The course in aviation recently inaugurated by the University Extension of the Massachusetts State Department of Education is open not only to the other states in the union and United States possessions but to residents of Canada as well.

In less than a month more than four hundred inquiries have been received regarding the correspondence course. The aeronautic course is the only one of its kind offered by a public institution. It includes the topics covered by the United States Department of Commerce for mechanics and pilots' licenses and is equivalent to the ground school technical training usually given to candidates for pilots' and mechanics' positions.

Elementary aeronautics, the aeroplane engine, structure and rigging of an aeroplane, aeroplane designs and air transportation are the subjects listed aside from the preparatory studies.

SAFETY OF LIFE AT SEA CONSIDERED

BOSTON, April 19.—The American delegation, headed by Congressman Wallace M. White of Maine, has sailed for London to attend the International Convention for Safety of Life at Sea, which opened April 16. The first such conference was held following the Titanic disaster in 1912, in which 1,500 persons lost their lives, and it is noted that the present conference is being held shortly after the sinking of the steamship Vestris, with loss of many lives. The conference was called, however, before the tragedy of the Vestris.

Those attending the conference, while realizing that absolute safety at sea is impossible, will direct their efforts to making travel on the high seas as safe as possible. Improved radio equipment, especially automatic devices which register calls for aid that may be used on small vessels without operators always on duty, will be considered, as will the use of lifeboats and small boats and rafts.

The conference is of particular interest to the United States in view of the announced intention of construction of other giant liners to be operated with the Leviathan.
