The funeral took place on Monday morning at 9 o'clock to the pro-cathedral thence to the Catholic Cemetery. The Mass at the church was celebrated by Father Peter Duffy, who also performed the funeral service. Father G. C. McLellan, D. D., officiated at the grave.

**A WORD IN TIME.**—A gentleman of Charlottetown who has been a resident of the Northwest for some years, in a letter to his home, which was received here on Friday tells of the big financial stringency that prevails all through the west. Where his home is in Manitoba a large number of men have been laid off from all sorts of work, railway, telephone and from private industries because there is not money enough in circulation to meet the wage demand. He says "We are cold and grumble if we have the least bit of a snow storm, but some of these poor individuals pray for it, for if the telephone lines or train tracks are blocked it means a few days or weeks' work. The weather here has been so mild that scarcely any extra work has been available. Perhaps a word in time would save some of the young fellows back home from giving up a good substantial job to come west, for unless he is provided with a position before leaving he will never get it on his arrival. **MILITARY TRAINING.**—The January number of the Canadian Defence Magazine, which has just come to hand, contains an article on a speech made by Principal Gordon, of Kingston University, and well known in this province where he has visited relatives at various times. The speech was made at banquet given recently at the University and was in reply to the toast of the Institute. Mr. Gordon spoke among other things, on Military Training and declared it to be one of the best kinds of training for young men. He said he was strongly in favor of this training, as one of the first lessons in citizenship was to know how to defend the country. "I know," he said, "that we may be told there is no danger. Let us eat and drink and make merry for tomorrow will be the same as today. But danger sometimes comes as a bolt from the blue. It came in that fashion in 1885 in the out-break of the Northwest Rebellion. A generation has arisen since then that can hardly realize the serious nature of that rebellion or the greatness of the service then rendered our country by our volunteer force." Dr. Gordon knows of what he speaks in dealing with the Bell Rebellion for he was one of the volunteers that went to the far north in those trying days to serve his Queen and Country. Further in the speech Mr. Gordon dealt with the necessity of an army, the outlook from east and west and military drill.

**THE PRINCE EDWARD.**—Large audiences greeted the splendid show at the Prince Edward last evening. The change of program included: By the Two Oak Trees, a splendid picture illustrating the greed of a mail carrier and his wife, who contrive to steal \$15,000 entrusted to the carrier's care, and they are worsted by a little wild girl, who knows of the graft, and whom they try to kill; "Timing Cupid," an old story of love and trouble; "Through Trackless Sands, a beautiful story of heroism repaid; and the crowning reel of the evening, Silas Marner, that famous and well read story of George Elliott. This picture was in two acts of three reels and pictured Silas, his terrible misfortunes, the Cass's, Dunstan and Godfrey and their father the squire; Dunstan's horrible death in the quarry; Godfrey's secret marriage, his child, and his second marriage; his repentance and the child's choice of Marner, who had cared for her till womanhood, were all as portrayed in the Revue. The Rosary, sung by Mr. Cairns was lovely and Miss Gardiner in Whistle was applauded.

**FOR THE HOSPITAL.**—The Basket Social and Entertainment recently held in the Knights of Columbus Hall, Queen Street, was as well as an enjoyable affair, a great success financially. The substantial sum of \$93 was realized for the benefit of the Charlottetown Hospital.

**SCHOOL BOARD MEETING.**—A meeting of the Charlottetown School Board was held last evening at 7.30 o'clock. The principals of the city schools were present and recommended the appointment of a "Visitors Day" when the parents and others would be invited to see the working of the schools. The suggestion was approved by the Board and left in the hands of the Principals to advertise a day in the term for each school. Dr. Jenkins advocated medical inspection of the City Schools, which was a matter of vital vigor and should be attended to as soon as possible. A committee of three—Dr. Jenkins and Messrs. T. C. James and J. J. Johnston were appointed to present a petition to the Legislature and the City Council in regard to this and other matters. A number of bills were passed and other routine business attended to.

**VICTROLA RECITAL.**—At the invitation of Professor H. A. Tanton, about 150 persons last night attended a Victrola recital which was given in his parlors, Great George street. The Victrola is recognized as one of the world's greatest phonographic instruments, and its reputation was easily maintained last night when a varied program of over twenty numbers was rendered upon one of these high-class machines. Lovers of classical music had a rare treat provided for them, there being a number of the richest gems of grand opera by the world's greatest singers reproduced on the Victrola, for which type of machine Mr. Tanton is local agent. Mayor Lyons, who was among those present, voiced the sentiments of the audience when he expressed their indebtedness to Prof. Tanton for providing them with such an enjoyable entertainment, and on their behalf tendered him a hearty vote of thanks.
