SUPREME COURT.

THURSDAY, Jan. 12.

The trespass case of Jewell vs. Buchanan is still before the court. It will probably be concluded to-morrow.

This morning the prisoners, George Thorne, John Trainor, and Edward Hughes, against whom indictments were yesterday found for manslaughter, were severally arraigned. They pleaded not guilty and said they would be ready for trial on Monday next. The court refused to continue the bail in Thorne's case.

John Hughes, against whom an indictment for common assault was found, was also arraigned. He pleaded not guilty and said he would be ready for trial on Monday next. Hughes was admitted to bail.

Peter Keenan, indicted for stealing from the person, was arraigned and pleaded not guilty. He said he would be ready for trial on Monday.

George Donovan, indicted for receiving stolen goods, also pleaded not guilty, and said he would be ready for trial on Monday.

Joseph McAleer and William Doyle, indicted for larceny, pleaded not guilty and said they would be ready for trial on Monday.

The Grand Jury visited the government institutions today. They reported that the Poor House was too crowded and the sick inmates should be removed to another place, otherwise the place was in good shape being clean and well kept.

On their investigation of the Insane Asylum, they found the building too small for the number of inmates.

They brought in a list of constables and fence viewers and after making their reports, received their discharge.
