Only Time Factor Kept "Big Train" In Partial Check

TORONTO, Aug. 28—(CP)—As Montreal Maroons skated off the Forum ice on April 23, 1937, after dropping a 4-0 decision and their Stanley Cup honors to New York Rangers, few Montreal fans realized they had seen the end of an era. But one of the greatest careers in Canadian sports history was over. Lionel Conacher—the "Big Train"—had just played his last professional game.

During more than 20 years of competition, Conacher excelled in many sports: swimming and track; hockey, lacrosse, baseball, hockey, boxing and wrestling. He was a better-than-average performer in each, and many experts say the "Big Train" could have reached championship level in any of them.

Frequently the lack of time didn't allow Conacher to show his powerful physique and almost phenomenal endurance. He often went directly from one game to another and started in both.

In 1920 he tripled in the winning run of a game for the Toronto baseball championship. He rushed to the other end of town to play in a game for the Ontario championship. Conacher's four team from Grand Island, Ontario, won the first time in 1916 on a schoolyard rink near his home in uptown Toronto. Six years later he refused an offer of \$5,000 to play with Montreal Canadiens. After turning pro in 1924 he stayed in the game for 13 years. Two famous brothers—Chuck and Roy—also made the N. H. L.

Feared Ball Carrier

He was always more at home at rugby and the half-line for Toronto Argonauts in the early 20's, one of the most feared ball carriers in the international top. In one game against Montreal he gained 227 yards, an average of 12.2 yards per minute.

As a boxer he won the Canadian light-heavyweight championship and once boxed for an exhibition round with Jack Dempsey, who split the fight. He was the leading professional rugby star and started with Montreal Maroons of the International Professional Lacrosse League. In 1926, he played baseball for Toronto Maple Leafs winners of the Little World Series.

A record like Conacher's inevitably brought its toll of injuries—his nose still bears the scars of eight fractures and he has had more than 200 stitches in his 200-pound six foot frame.

After his retirement, the "Big Train" continued his interest in sports. He was elected to Ontario Legislature from Toronto-Brampton in 1927 and became chairman of the Ontario Athletic Commission and director of recreation for the R. C. A. F. during the war.

Now a successful businessman, his eye overlooks the playground of Toronto's Jesse Ketchum School, where he began a career that extended to all the sports in the vocabularies of supra-scribes from coast to coast.

Senate Contct May Delay "Preference" Vote

CANBERRA, Australia, Aug. 28—(CP)—Australian returning officers may be busy for days ahead of Sept. 28, polling day in the forthcoming federal elections, counting ballots cast for Senate candidates under the "preference" system of voting.

Not appointed for life as they are in Canada, Australian Senators are elected for six-year terms and because their electoral districts are state-wide, as many as 20 and 30 counts of the same ballots are sometimes necessary under the preferential system before winners are decided in each state.

The Australian Senate's six-year terms overlap every three years federal elections are held. The Senate's 36 seats become vacant in one of the six Australian states, three senators are chosen to fill them.

The preferential voting system requires the Australian voter to give the order of his individual preference for all the candidates listed on his divisional ballot paper, and it means he has to rank up a dozen Senate candidates running for the three spots in his state.

When the time comes to figure out the winners, electoral officers must count all the ballots several times to sort out and add up the totals of the different degrees of preference given by voters who have listed on their voting slips their first, second, third and fourth choice and so on, as they ranked all candidates.

Long Job

The job is long because of the large numbers of votes involved. In the state of New South Wales, for instance, up to 1,000,000 votes are cast. Since there are no electoral divisions for Senate representation other than state boundaries, all these 1,000,000 votes are involved in the single balloting for the state's three Senate seats.

The three Senate winners are the men who receive the largest
