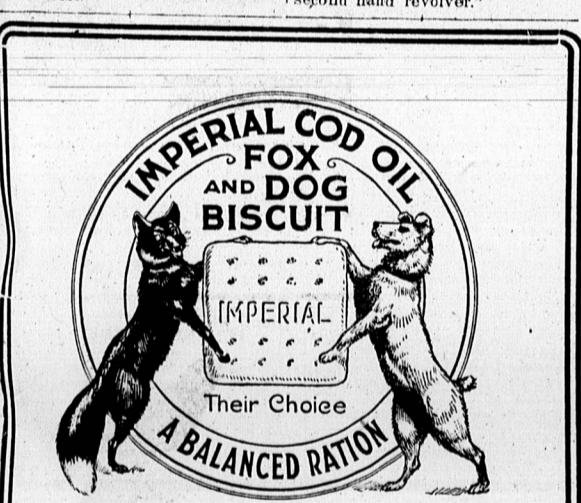

ed along the winter roads, every 200 yards, in order to provide places for teams to pass each other. Let the hon. members just figure up the cost of such a project. There are about 4,000 miles of roads in the Province; that means about 717,000 yards, or 23,667 of those switches. To bush the switches, as suggested, would require, say, six ounces to every switch, or about 28,150 loads of bushes at \$1.00 a load. But that would only be one side; you would have to double that so that the people could go by on both sides, which would mean an expense of about \$112,600. Would the hon. member from the Second District of Prince approve of that? Does he think that the Leader of the Opposition was responsible when he made that suggestion? (Laughter.) That was an example of the funny things that have been said by the Opposition members.

Continuing, Hon. Mr. McEwen said there was one thing which the Liberal members should never mention again, and that was the sinking funds of the Bell Government. The last speaker (Mr. Dennis) argued that all governments had used these sinking funds. Yes, but why? Because if there are deposits in the treasury of a few dollars it is not always possible to invest these in proper securities at the time, and they must be left until this can be done. That was all that had ever been done by the Conservative government.

Mr. DENNIS: Tut! tut!
HON. MR. MCEWEN: If you are still unconvinced I will only have to take you to some private room and instruct you as to the case. (Laughter.) I want to say that no Conservative Government ever made it a rule to steal out of the sinking funds and use that money in current account in the Bank, as the Bell Government did.

Mr. DENNIS: If they didn't take the money and put it in current account, where did they put it? They took it out.

HON. MR. MCEWEN: Who took it out?

Mr. DENNIS: The Conservative governments.

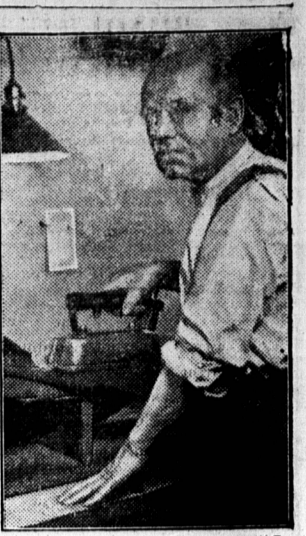
HON. MR. MCEWEN: When? Mr. DENNIS: You say they didn't take it out and put it in current account. Where did they put it?

HON. MR. MCEWEN: You know very well that the money goes into the treasury in money paid in from day to day, some days more than another. If it is used for the sinking funds they cannot always buy a bond to suit at the time; they have to leave it there for a few days. I hope I make myself clear; I want my hon. friend to get this.

Mr. DENNIS: I have it.

HON. MR. MCEWEN: I don't think you have. I used to teach school and I have had boys of just the same nature. I had to stand them in a corner. (Laughter.) All the money taken out of the sinking funds was just a few dollars, starting in 1913 with \$2,782.04, and for only a short time, and was invested at the first opportunity. But you people in 1922, in one grab, took out \$148,176.09 and put in a little slip, an "I.O.U." for that amount. You took that over to the Bank of Montreal and put it to the credit of the current account. Those are facts on which I defy contradiction. (Applause.)

Mr. DENNIS: You are telling the House the same thing as I told them, only you are telling it in a different way. (Laughter.)
HON. MR. MCEWEN: My hon. friend has got into the habit of thinking in a certain way, and he cannot get out of it.
