SIR HOWARD VINCENT'S VIEWS.

Sir Howard Vincent, M. P., the Conservative representative of Sheffield in the British House of Commons visited Canada some six or seven years ago and spoke in different cities of the Dominion. Then as now he was an ardent protectionist differing in that regard not only from his party leaders, but from the leading statesmen of both parties. Representing as he does the great manufacturing centre for outlery his repeated re-election would none the less seem to indicate that there is a pretty stiff protectionist sentiment in Sheffield.

Sir Howard Vincent is also the honorary secretary of the United Empire Trade League, and it was as a representative of that body that his visit to Canada was made. No doubt he and his constituents desire protection for its own sake, and in order to shut out in part from the British manufacturers the competition of the goods made in Germany and the United States. Their manufactures are now admitted free to England while British goods are met by heavy duties of 40 to 60 per cent in the United States. This competition is felt with greatly increased force in recent years.

The costly wars in South Africa and China involve a vast expenditure and call for increased revenue in the United Kingdom. This condition, to Sir Howard Vincent's mind calls for the imposition of duties upon foreign manufactures. The plan he outlines is somewhat in accord with that proposed by Sir Charles Tupper but with this difference that he does not propose duties upon the raw materials and bread-stuffs derived from foreign countries, but upon their manufactured products. He would give the Colonies a preference of course, but that would be of comparatively little value to us now, as we could not compete successfully in the British market in that line. The time is doubtless coming when we might do so.

We note that Sir Howard is being quoted with favor by the Conservative press in Canada, as though he were quite in accord with Sir Charles Tupper's scheme of preferential trade. This is not true. None the less there has been apparently some unsettlement of British opinion on trade questions and the movements are worth watching. Should it now or hereafter be found practicable to improve our trade relations with the Mother Country under a scheme of preferential treatment, or in any way the opportunity ought not to be lost.

The Morine-Reid party which was so signally defeated at the recent election in Newfoundland appears to have had, like Mr. Kruger, some newspapers in England Canada and the United States devoted to its interests. We believe, however, that prevalent feeling in Canada is one of satisfaction over the result of the Newfoundland land elections. Ford's call to the New York Tribune states that the English public were delighted with the Bond Government's victory. If such is the state of British feeling it may have an important bearing upon Mr. Reid's financial schemes, as he is looking for British capital to develop his vast possessions.

An alarmist despatch from Cape Town states that the Colony is on the verge of revolt and it is feared that most serious trouble will follow the meeting of the Dutch Congress next week, whatever that may be. We do not apprehend that the situation is quite so grave as has been represented, although the Dutch population of the Cape are no doubt strongly in sympathy with the Boers of the late Republics, and are unwilling to have their national independence wholly swept away, as it has been.

Simultaneously with this disturbing report comes another of the discovery of a plot against the life of President McKinley.

Col. Oter with 300 officers and men of Royal Canadian Regiment were yesterday expected to arrive in Southampton, England. There is no doubt that they will be most heartily received and welcomed. The second half of the Regiment with its Colonel in command will be more generally representative of the Regiment and its work than any previous body of Canadians who have reached England on their return from the war.

THREATEN TO STRIKE.

TORONTO, Nov. 28.—The assistant printing press feeders have served notice on their employers that unless an advance from seven to nine dollars a week is granted by December 3rd, they will strike.
