Noted Musicians May Be Brought By New Project

At a public meeting to be held at the Canadian National Hotel this afternoon at 5.00, music lovers and others interested in the cultural advancement of Charlottetown will have an opportunity to show their interest in a community concert project which, if established in Charlottetown, will insure to its members at least three major concerts by great artists annually with no charge after the comparatively small membership fee. The larger the membership, the more concerts will be possible. E. F. MERRILL, representative of the project, is in the city and met yesterday with some representative musically-minded people, who desired that the expression of public opinion in the matter be heard at an open mass meeting. The success of the project here depends largely upon the attendance at this meeting. Mr. Merrill said that with 400 members or more, it will be possible to bring to Charlottetown such noted artists as Jacha Hefetz, Mischa Elman, Albert Spalding, Maria Kurenko, Richard Bonelli, London String Quartet, Hart House String Quartet, English Singers, Jeanne Dusseau, Ernest Hutcheson and countless other world famous musicians.

The membership is obtained by a week's campaign, he stated, after which the local committee selects the artists. The association is self-supporting and does away entirely with the assumption of any financial risk on the part of any individual or organization. Canadian cities already operating such a service include Halifax, Saint John, Moncton, Hamilton, Kitchener, London, Stratford and St. Thomas. Membership in the local association admits a person free of charge to concerts given by the association in any other city. Only members are admitted to any concerts. 460-2-3-11.

Thinks Britain Should Announce Fleets Intention

WINDSOR, Ont., Feb. 1.—(By The Canadian Press)—Great Britain should announce her Mediterranean fleet is sailing for "winter manoeuvres" in Chinese waters and the Pacific fleets, Judge Ernest O'Brien of the United States Federal court at Detroit, told a Windsor service club gathering today. Threats of a world war, flaring in the Orient, would thus vanish he argued.

The jurist expressed the opinion such a move would cause the Japanese to back down. He reasoned that war being based on public sentiment, it could be averted through public fear.

British Journalist Missing In Shanghai

SHANGHAI, Feb. 2.—(Canadian Press Cable via Reuters)—Anxiety was felt today regarding the whereabouts of Henry Benson Currie, described as a Canadian Journalist, who entered the battle-scarred Chapel area of Shanghai Sunday carrying a Union Jack to bring out the mother of a Chinese friend. He has been missing since Sunday.

After venturing into the Chapel section and bringing back his wife and two children as well as his Chinese acquaintance, Currie returned for the mother of the Chinese. Many were killed in the area into which Currie has vanished. Currie carried a slip of paper inscribed in Chinese characters: "You must follow me out. I am a British subject and your son asked me to fetch you."
