FACTS ABOUT YOURSELF.

The average number of teeth is 32. The weight of the circulating blood is 29 pounds. The average weight of an adult is 150 pounds 6 ounces. The brain of a man exceeds twice that of any animal. A man breathes about 20 times a minute, or 1,200 times an hour. The average weight of the brain of

a man is 3 1/2 pounds; of a woman, 2 pounds 11 ounces.

Five hundred and forty pounds, or one hoghead and one and a quarter pints, of blood pass through the heart in one hour.

The average height of an Englishman is 5 feet 9 inches; of a Frenchman, 5 feet 4 inches; of a Belgium, 5 feet 6 1/2 inches.

The heart sends nearly 10 pounds of blood through the veins and arteries each beat, and makes four beats while we breathe once.

One hundred and seventy-five million cells are in the lungs, which would cover a surface thirty times greater than the human body.

The average of the pulse in infancy is 120 per minute; in manhood, 80; at sixty years, 60. The pulse of females is more rapid than that of males.—Tit Bits.

CATS BREAK UP HOME.

(Boston Magazine.) Dr. Robert A. Pierce, of Worcester, Mass., says that cats have broken up his home and is suing his wife for separation.

Mrs. Pierce, the owner of 32 cats complained of, is well known in New York and Boston as an exhibitor of blue ribbon angoras. According to the story told in court by Mr. Pierce, they crawled mewing about the rooms and halls. They slept in the bath tub during the day. They crept into coat pockets and took up quarters in hats and other wearing apparel.

Numerous cat autopsies were held to discover the causes of deaths in the broods. One part of the house was turned into a laboratory and pharmacy, where cat medicine was kept. Litters of kittens turned up in the most unexpected places—in his hat, for instance—and yowls and fights enlivened the evening and sleeping hours. Dr. Pierce testified that the limit was reached when various members of the cat colony began to dine with him and Mrs. Pierce. Therefore, last October, after much disagreement on the subject, the Pierces agreed to break up their home.
