



conditions in 1929, and that meadows, having come through the winter in good shape, were showing very well. While the warm weather had proved helpful in aiding the work of the farmers of the district, Mr. Nixon thought rain was required to get the frost out of the ground.

Mr. Nixon said that last year, in the 17 creameries of the district of Temiskaming and Cochrane, nearly 1,000,000 pounds of butter were produced. When the first creamery was established in New Liskeard in March 1917, the output for the remainder of that year was 40,000 pounds.

In the past three years the sheep population of the Temiskaming district has been trebled, and farmers are realizing the advantages of this line, according to Mr. Nixon. Fifty thoroughbred bulls have been brought into the district since June of 1928, he said, in dealing with the improvement in live stock noted in the Temiskaming area.
