The latest news, first of all.

THE SOUL OF RELIGION.

The Venerable Archdeacon Armitage M. A. Ph. D., of St. Paul's Cathedral Halifax officiated at three services in St. Paul's Church, in this city Sunday.

At night Dr. Armitage delivered an earnest and impressive sermon in reply to the statement made at the Eucharistic Congress, in Montreal by Father Bernard Vaughan, the celebrated Jesuit of London, regarding the Protestant religion. The text of the sermon was Matthew 18.20. "Where two or three are gathered together in my name, there am I in the midst of them." At the outset Dr. Armitage referred to the press despatches which have been sent out from London that King Edward had died a Roman Catholic, that Father Vaughan had been admitted to his bedside by a secret entrance and given him the last rites of the church, and that the King was wearing a papal tiara. These reports which had been circulated throughout India, as well as other parts of the Empire were all emphatically denied by Sir Francis Laeking, one of the King's physicians.

Father Vaughan formulated his attack on Protestantism in the form of the following syllogism: "The sacrifice of the Mass is the soul of religion; Protestantism is without the Mass and is therefore without the soul of religion. Dr. Armitage held that Father Vaughan's major premise is false, and his conclusions were therefore also false. The charge can be disproved by appeal to the scriptures, to history, and Christian experience. Dr. Armitage then quoted the words of the greatest Roman Catholic theologians as to what the Mass signifies. They all held that in the celebration of the Mass when the wafer is eaten and the wine drunk, that Christ dies again that there is repeated over again what happened on Calvary, that the sacrifice of the Mass is the same in quality and substance as the sacrifice on Calvary. If Father Vaughan is right said Dr. Armitage, the Epistle of the Heu-


