NARROW ESCAPE.—What might have been a serious accident occurred at Rollo Bay on Tuesday evening Feb. 27th. While Wm. Power, Little Harbor, John F. Fergueson and Augustus MacDonald of Souris were returning from Georgetown, the horse shied suddenly and driving as they were, at a good roading clip, the sleigh was overturned and the occupants precipitated unceremoniously, to say the least, on the icy road. There they remained for some minutes and the spirited horse went on at the gallop reducing the sleigh to pieces in his wild career. Finally he was stopped at Mr. Thos. Warner's, Souris West, having some scratches of course, but not seriously injured. The three men consider they escaped very fortunately, that clear of the surprise an athe shaking up they were not otherwise hurt.

THE BEAVER COLONY.—The Beaver Colony of 48 Road is a place of much interest to the curious and has many visitors. The dam which is built about seventy yards from the 48 Road is forty feet in length by actual measurement and is built to a height of seven feet. It is said by those who examined it before the ice formed to be a marvel of engineering skill and ingenuity. The beaver house is situated about half way between the dam and the road. It is cone-shaped, strong, built of sticks and twigs plastered with mud and is well sheltered by a large spruce tree at the foot of which it is built as well as by several smaller trees. Close to the house are several large poplar trees, which have evidently been felled for the use of their bark which is said to form the principal part of the beavers' food. Occasional glimpses of the animal's were seen while the dam was building as many as seven beavers having been seen at one time.
