Successful W. I. District Convention

The twentieth annual district convention of the Women's Institutes, which included Linkletter, New Annan, North St. Eleanor's, Read's Corner, St. Eleanor's, Sherbrooke, Travellers Rest, Belmont, Southwest and Central Lot 16, was held on Friday afternoon in St. Eleanor's hall with a splendid attendance. Mrs. Fred Mahar presided. The meeting was opened by the singing of the Institute Ode and the repeating of the Creed in unison, after which Miss Mary MacLure read an address of welcome and was responded to by Mrs. Elmer Ramsay of Southwest Lot 16. The secretary, Mrs. Arthur MacKinnon, read the minutes of the last meeting, following which each secretary submitted an annual report of branch activities. Miss Maylea Boswell, provincial assistant supervisor, congratulated the institutes on their work and informed them of the Government grant being increased to \$2. She outlined a plan for the jubilee endowment fund in which the one dollar increase could go to the fund, suggesting each institute raise money for this fund. After discussion by the members, a motion to this effect was carried. Miss Boswell introduced the food club idea, which is to be started this summer and to include cooking, interior decorating and household managing. Her main topic on interior decorating, which was illustrated, was most educational. The sing-song of the afternoon was in charge of the New Annan Institute with Mrs. Harold Moase at the piano. The next speaker was Mr. J. P. MacInnis, executive secretary of the Cancer Society who spoke on the battle against cancer. On behalf of the Canadian Cancer Society in grand council in Toronto, he extended thanks to the Women's Institutes of Prince Edward Island for the splendid cooperation in the organization of cancer control. He remarked on the progress that had been made in surgery during the past twenty-five years and stated that cancer could be controlled by means of deep therapy, radium and surgery, if detected in its early stage. For the contribution to the educational part of the program, Sherbrooke Institute invited Mrs. G. A. Boehner who chose for her subject "Your Community Hospital Service to the Public and its Needs". She spoke on the great changes in methods during recent years, stating there were more patients admitted as a result of
