Report of the General Secretary for the Months of June, July, August and September, 1925.

To the President and Board of Directors. Sirs.—The summer months since our last meeting in June have been quiet ones, as far as program is concerned in the Building.

Annual Sports Banquet The last season's work was brought to a successful close on the fifth of June, when about one hundred members and friends attended our annual sports banquet.

Summer Program As usual, June saw the transfer of training from the Building to the two athletic fields, where during both June and July an active course of training for our Junior and Senior members was carried out by Mr. Walker, who gave of his very best in developing our athletes so that they might make a real showing in the various meets.

Maritime Summer Institute, Big Cove, N.S. This was a new departure designed to bring together leaders laymen and secretaries for a ten days' school.
