**HOSPITAL FOR CANADIAN WOUNDED.**  
OTTAWA, Ont., May 19.—The establishment of a clearing hospital at Quebec and possibly at Valcartier, for the classification of wounded members of the Canadian expeditionary force, who are sent home as incapacitated, is being projected.  
As the number of badly wounded or shattered victims of Langemarck fighting arrive, they will be examined by a medical staff. Those who are not in a condition to be moved, will be kept in the hospital. Others will be sent to convalescent homes, which are to be established in various parts of the Dominion, while others go to their own homes. Men, who have been incapacitated from earning a living by reason of their wounds, will be at once pensioned, while the less seriously wounded will receive active service pay until ready to resume their occupation when they will cease to be soldiers. Those who go home to convalesce will be stricken off the pay roll, but will be provided for by the Canadian Patriotic Fund.

**LA BAIE DE CHALEUR**  
Associated with the early history and discovery of Canada the name of Jacques Cartier will ever hold a commanding and unique position. It was he, who, nearly five hundred years ago, or to be exact July 10, 1634, sailed into this magnificent haven. An exceptionally hot day inspired the name, and it has borne that name ever since. La Baie de Chaleur—the bay of heat—Ninety miles long and from fifteen to twenty miles wide, this arm of the Gulf of St. Lawrence divides the Gaspé Peninsula from the Province of New Brunswick and the depth is sufficient to ensure a safe passage for the largest ships afloat. As the bay narrows into the estuary of the Restigouche, the scenery becomes bolder and more majestic, presenting one of the most superb and fascinating panoramic views in America. The whole region is mountainous, and almost precipitous enough to be Alpine; but its grandeur is derived less from cliffs, chasms and peaks than from far-reaching wide outlines and continually rising domes that mingle with the clouds. On the Gaspé side, precipitous cliffs of brick-red sandstone flank the shore, so lofty that they seem to cast their gloomy shadows half-way across the bay, and yawn with rifts and gullies, through which fretful torrents tumble into the sea. Behind them the mountains rise and fall in long undulations of ultramarine, and towering above them all is the famous peak of Tracadigache, flashing in the sunlight like a pale blue amethyst.  
Around the shores of La Baie de Chaleur the land is settled for many miles and the picturesque hamlets and green pastures add to the beauty of the scene. The swell from the ocean breaks rhythmically upon smooth sandy beaches that tempt the bather. There are many coves and harbours where the boating is alluring and the shore of its risks. Sheltered at its mouth by the islands of Miscou and Shippegan, and restless as may be the sea beyond, the yachtsmen may guide his craft over the whitecaps when a stiff breeze is blowing, while there are often summer days when the bay is so placid that the small motor boat may safely venture into the open. The New Brunswick shore is followed by the line of the Intercolonial Railway from Campbellton to Bathurst and for a number of miles is in full view of the broad and beautiful expanse of water with the lofty and imposing mountains of Gaspé beyond.

**HORSE NOTE**  
A few years ago Prince Edward Island was noted for the quality of its heavy horses. Recently, however, Nova Scotia and New Brunswick have made quite a number of importations, which have placed them pretty nearly in the same class as Prince Edward

Island. Some, however, of the breeders have undertaken to restore Prince Edward Island to the leading position which it once occupied. A few years ago Mr. John Richards of Bideford imported "Boron Kelvin." This Spring Mr. James Roper of East Royalty has brought to the Island the beautiful bay stallion "Thornedale" foaled April 26th, 1912, and bred by Mr. W. P. Guilmore, of Chappellton, Kirkcubright Scotland, and two mares, one of which is Canadian bred. "Thornedale" will be a distinguished acquisition to the Clydesdale stallions 1860 pounds. He is a low set deep bodied horse with excellent limbs and sloping pasterns, giving him great action, and he travels almost as light as a carriage stallion. The mares are not of the same quality, but are much above average. Prince Edward Island should be proud of young men who have such faith in the Province, and are prepared to risk their money in bringing to it the best live stock that can be obtained.

**WAIFS OF WAR TAKEN TO PARIS**  
PARIS, May 18.—Three hundred children of Belgian farmers living near the fighting line—152 of them girls and 148 boys—arrived in Paris today. They made a total of two thousand children who have been brought into the capital from Belgium, French and British camps in recent months. Many of the children are orphans, or have been separated from their parents through the exigencies of war.  
Many of the waifs who have been cared for by the soldiers who call them trench rabbits. Some of them have actually sheltered in bomb proofs. Nearly all those who arrived today were carrying toys which had been made for them by their soldier guardians.  
Many children have been wounded by shells during the fighting in Northern France. About ninety have been treated in one large hospital near Arras. Some of them lost legs.  
One little boy, who was a special favorite of a detachment of the American Ambulance, had more toys given him than any other child in the neighborhood. He has now been brought to the American hospital in Paris. This boy's mother was killed by a shell. His father is serving in the French army.


