Back-To-Nature Scheme Nipped By Authorities

FREDERICTON, Sept. 10.—Burt W. McConnell, of New York, a New York journalist, who is contemplating entering the woods of Northern New Brunswick in the garb of Adam and maintaining himself there for a period of three months, has been given no permit to enter the forests of this province. Such permit must be issued by the Department of Lands and Mines for any person to have the legal right to travel in forest lands. What effect this will have on the plans of Mr. McConnell is not yet known. His departure from New York was expected today.

The department issued the following statement this afternoon: Special permits which have been requested by Burt M. McConnell, of the editorial staff, New York, to carry out an experiment of going into the New Brunswick woods without food, clothing, or weapons and there endeavoring to eke out an existence for three months, have been declined and Mr. McConnell was so notified some days ago. McConnell's announced intention was to come to Fredericton and thence go to Plaster Rock, Victoria County, from which place on the Tobique River he would make his way into the forests to carry out the experiment.

U. S. CORN AND WHEAT

WASHINGTON, Sept. 11.—The 1929 corn crop was forecast today by the Department of Agriculture on the basis of September first condition at 2,455,997,000 bushels, compared with 2,836,000,000 bushels harvested last year.

Indicated production of spring wheat was 53,032,000 bushels of durum and 164,461,000 bushels of other spring wheat, compared with 49,000,000 and 156,000,000 bushels indicated last month.

After Harvest Cultivation

By W. C. Hopper, Central Experimental Farm, Ottawa, Ont.

Ploughing hay and pasture sod in the late summer or early fall, followed by frequent working of the land with the disk harrow until late in the fall, will germinate the seeds of annual weeds and destroy the weed seedlings. If perennial weeds like couch grass are present, the ploughing of the sod should be about 5 inches in depth and this operation should be followed immediately by a light disking to prevent the soil baking. Two or three diskings in one week intervals should be made thereafter to break up the sod. After the sod is rotted the cultivator, preferably one with stiff teeth, should be used at week or ten-day intervals until late fall.

If the land to be cleared is grain stubble, it may not be necessary to plough the land after the grain is harvested, but the disk or cultivator may be started at once, and the soil worked frequently during the balance of the growing season.

A late fall ploughing should be given to the land to which these harvest cultivations are applied, and the land should be left rough over winter. If possible, a cultivated crop should be planted in the following spring, and this should be kept thoroughly worked in order to destroy the weeds which are left.

The weather which prevails during the late summer and fall will be a determining factor in the success which after harvest cultivation has on weed destruction. If the season is not too wet good results should attend these soil cultural operations.

WOMAN APOLOGISES, EXHIBIT NOT HER OWN

At least one woman exhibitor at the Canadian National Exhibition has admitted that work entered by her was not her own, but a gift received from a friend. She has written to the directors expressing regret. Recently the Exhibition authorities sent out letters to suspected exhibitors asking them if the work placed in competition was their own. The woman in question has replied that she had not read the rules, but in view of the fact that the piece of work in question which was a gift, was so beautiful that she thought it worth while showing.

The rules require that the work must be that of the exhibitor and must have been finished since September 1st, of the year previous.

Dismisses Married Employees

MELBOURNE, Australia, Sept. 10.—A large factory operating here and employing a large number of women has dismissed all its married women employees and will not engage any others in future, according to F. J. Riley, secretary of the Manufacturing Grocers' Union. Other firms are considering similar action.

"The original practice of the firm when shortening hands was to retain those longest in the service," said Mr. Riley. "Some of the married women had been working for many years and they were retained while single women were dismissed. This caused widespread dissatisfaction, and the company then decided to weed out all married women and to engage in future only single women."

"In the manufacturing grocer industry," added Mr. Riley, "the proportion of married women is the lowest of the industries employing women. The rate is less than three per cent. In other industries the rate is 13 per cent."

The question of employment of married women in factories is causing wide discussion in Australia at present.

LIVESTOCK REPORT

MONTREAL, Sept. 11.—There were 38 cattle, 36 calves, 272 hogs and 53 sheep and lambs for sale on the two live stock markets here today.

The cattle were all bulls. Very light common bulls were about steady at \$5.00 and bulls of better weights were easier at \$5.00 to \$5.25. The calves sold from \$6.00 to \$13.00 and the lambs were around \$11.00. Sheep were unchanged.

BUILDING UP WESTERN CATTLE

(Canadian Press) VICTORIA, B. C., Sept. 11.—As a means of building up the health of Western Canadian cattle, the British Columbia government is encouraging the use of fish meal as feed. The fish meal is manufactured from pilchards which are caught in millions off the west coast of Vancouver Island.

According to Hon. S. L. Howe, commissioner of fisheries, it has been shown that calves fed on a ration of fish meal had at the end of a year an average height of two and a half inches in excess of the standard and an average weight of 30 pounds in excess of the standard weight. He added that herds fed on a ration of fish meal are free from goitre and abortion, and that cases of bovine tuberculosis are relatively unknown among cattle so fed.


