

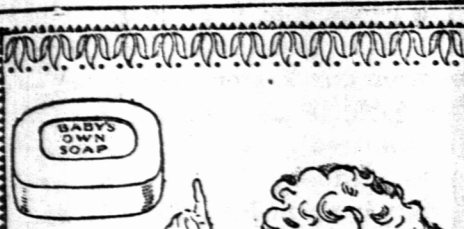
**NO PEACE NEGOTIATIONS.**

**THE SECOND DAY'S**

Proceedings Largely Taken up With the Reports of Colleges.

Ottawa June 14.—On resuming work in the General Assembly yesterday afternoon, after the appointment of committees on the reception of ministers and on results, attention was given to the interests of three of the colleges belonging to the church.

Dr. Sedgewick, Principal Forrest, Principal Pollok and the Rev. J. A. McDonald handled the report of the board of the Presbyterian College, Halifax.

The receipts for the eleven months ended on Feb. 28 last were \$10,905.80, as against \$11,207.53 for the preceding year. The income from interest has been \$8,913.59, as against \$8,740.93 for the previous year; from donations, \$284.40, as against \$250; and from congregations \$3,533.07, as against \$4,166.57. Repayments have been \$174.74. The expenditure amounted to \$11,486.23, or \$580.45 in excess of receipts, which, added to a debt of \$368.14 the year previous, made an adverse balance of \$1,413.59. Daniel Alexander Murray, M. A., Ph. D., was recommended as successor to the late Charles McDonald, M. A. as a professor of apologetics in Dalhousie College.

**THE MONTREAL COLLEGE.**

Mr. David Morrice presented the report of the Montreal Presbyterian College, as follows:

The board of management of the Presbyterian College, Montreal, have pleasure in reporting another year of prosperous work. The number of students enrolled was fifty-eight. Of this number nine were studying with a view to the work of French evangelization. Ten students completed their theological course in the spring, nearly all of whom have since been licensed and have begun their life work.

The board has, during the year, received from Dr. F. W. Kelley, Montreal, the sum of \$500 for the endowment of a scholarship for competition among students in the arts course, and since the books closed, the sum of \$1,400 has been received from Mrs. Peter Rodpath, of England, to endow a scholarship bearing the name of her late husband, who, in his lifetime, was a generous friend of the college. The travelling fellowship of \$500, established by Mr. W. J. Morrice, was awarded for the first time at the close of the session. It is hoped that this fellowship will prove a helpful stimulus to the students.

**QUEEN'S UNIVERSITY.**

On behalf of Queen's University, Principal Grant presented the report.

The total number registered last session was 727—in the Faculty of Arts, 479; Medicine, 151; Practical Science, 73; Theology, 35; 733 in all, or—allowing for students registered in two faculties—727, as compared with 630 the preceding session.

On account of the steadily increasing number of students in the Faculty of Arts, and an announcement by the chancellor that unless additional accommodation was provided, pass students might have to be excluded in future, the finance committee of the Kingston City Council sought a conference with the university authorities, and, after full dis-

ussion of the situation, recommended the City Council to submit to the ratepayers a by-law granting \$50,000 for an additional building. The by-law was submitted to vote on Oct. 16—University Day—and was carried by an overwhelming majority, all denominations—including the highest representatives of the Roman Catholic, Anglican, Methodist, Baptist and Congregational churches, and of the Jewish community—uniting in its support, and the Council of the Trades and Labor organizations of the city, after an intelligent discussion of the subject taking the same position. It is impossible to underrate the significance of this action, and the General Assembly will, on more grounds than one, appreciate it as fully as the trustees. The County Council is also giving favorable consideration to a proposal to submit a by-law to the people of the county of Frontenac granting the university \$20,000 for an enlarged examination and convocation hall, greatly needed on account of the university's growth.

The financial statements show a small surplus, notwithstanding the fact that there was a serious falling off in the amount received from the General Assembly's college fund.

**KNOX COLLEGE.**

Mr. William Mortimer Clark, K. C. presented the report of the board of management of Knox College, Toronto.

Sixty-seven students were enrolled in the theological classes during the past session. Of these, twenty-seven received their diplomas at the close of the academic year.

The Rev. Dr. Proudfoot, who for the past thirty-four years has discharged the duties of lecturer on homiletics with distinguished ability, has found it necessary from advancing years and the desire to devote himself to some literary work which he has had in contemplation, to resign his position.

**MANITOBA COLLEGE.**

The Hon. Colin H. Campbell, K. C., reported on behalf of the board of management of Manitoba College.

The total number of students during the current summer session in theology is twenty-five and the total number of arts students enrolled during the winter session now closed was 150. At the examinations conducted by the University of Manitoba last month the students of Manitoba College won seven medals and eleven scholarships, that is Manitoba College, which is one of the four arts colleges in the university federation won more than half the honors open to her.

The total contributions from congregations and individuals in North West Territories and Manitoba amounted to \$4,925, of which \$4,800 was appropriated to the ordinary fund and \$125 to the scholarship fund. This contribution is practically the same as that of the previous years, which was the highest in the history of the college. This high rate of giving is the more worthy of remark when it is noticed that the grain crop on which we depend in so great a degree was throughout the greater part of our constituency much below the average.

The congregational contributions from Ontario and Quebec and from the Maritime Provinces are almost to a dollar the same as a year ago. In addition to these congregational gifts, the Rev. Dr. Robertson has been in the habit for several years in virtue of his appointment as convener of a committee of the General Assembly, of collecting a considerable sum to offset the gradually decreasing income from Eastern congregations. On account of Dr. Robertson's absence from Canada last winter the board deputed Professor Baird to take up this work and he spent three weeks in March and April in Ontario and Quebec, and secured a sum of money (Continued on Fourth Page.)
