Montreal dealers paying delivered extra 22 to 25, firsts 20 to 31, seconds 25 to 27, firsts 25, 30, 35, 39, firsts 25, 30, 35, 39, seconds 24 to 26, firsts 38, 39, seconds 24 to 26, Winnipeg dealers paying country shippers extra 28, firsts 26, seconds 22, delivered extra 33 to 35, firsts 30 to 32, tailers extra 33 to 35, firsts 30 to 31, seconds 26. Retail extras 42 to 45, firsts 33, 38, 39, firsts 33 to 35, seconds 20, Saskatchewan country shippers were selling extra 25, firsts 24, seconds 18 delivered cases returned. Duty on American Autos Reduced

OTTAWA, June 11.—The automobile tariff changes passed by the House tonight reduced customs duty on American automobiles valued at under \$1,000 from 35 to 20 per cent, on those valued at over \$1,000 from 35 to 27 1/2 per cent. The five percent luxury tax on cheap Canadian made cars is abolished on the American car.

New Industry for The City to be in Operation Shortly

Charlottetown is to have, before long, an up-to-date pasteurizing plant, which it is hoped by the officers of the company to be in operation about the first of July.
The promoters are all city and provincial successful business men and farmers and there is no doubt that the venture will be a success.
The company will be known as "The Pure Milk Co., Ltd.," and application for Letters Patent have been made to the Governor General in Council.
The following well known gentlemen comprise the company:—Chester M. Cox, R. E. Mutch, H. J. Phillips, S. R. Jenkins, M. D. H. D. Johnson, M. D. A. Pickett, J. O. Hyndman, W. A. Stewart, Lucy B. Cox, Geo. J. Rogers, Wm. Lowe, S. A. McDonald, all of this city; Solomon Mutch, Wilfred E. Boyer, J. Walter Jones, Edmund Bay, and J. Herbert Love, East Valley.

The capital stock is \$100,000 divided into 100 shares of \$1,000 each.
An excellent location has been secured for the plant—the building on the corner of P.R.roy and Great George Streets having been purchased from Gill & Lantz.

Work will be commenced at once refitting and remodeling the building. A concrete basement will be put in and possibly the first floor or street floor will also be concreted. Other necessary changes will also be made before the arrival of the machinery which has been ordered and expected to arrive in about two weeks.

It may be mentioned that all the machinery is of the very latest types with the most modern improvements, and absolutely sanitary.

The separator, cooler, clarifier and churn will be operated electrically while steam will necessarily be used for the pasteurizer and sterilizer.

An American glass lined pasteurizer is to be installed which the clarifier will absolutely eliminate all sediment.

Refrigeration has not yet been decided on the directors having under consideration two or three different systems.

A retail store where all dairy products, will be handled will be on the corner of the building and teams for delivery of milk, cream, butter, buttermilk, etc., will be provided.

The provisional directors are Messrs. Chester M. Cox, R. E. Mutch, and H. J. Phillips with Mr. Cox plant manager.

Banquet Tendered To Women's Institute Delegates

One of the most pleasing functions held in Charlottetown this week was the banquet given Wednesday evening to the delegates attending the Convention of the Women's Institute by the auxiliaries of the P.E.I. Protestant and St. Vincent's orphanages, and the Charlottetown Board of Trade.

Quite a number of citizens was also present, and all enjoyed heartily the excellent spread that was provided.

Mr. J. O. Hyndman, President of the Associated Boards of Trade, presided, and in his opening remarks he congratulated the Institute members on the wonderful success of their organization had met with. The Convention with so many women present from all over the Province, was an event that was both unique in itself, and unequalled moreover in any other part of Canada.

His Worship Mayor Miller, in extending the delegates the freedom of the city, said that those who originated the idea of the Women's Institute must have had a divine vision.

Referring to the Institute motto, "Home and Country" His Worship said that the home was right, the country would be right also. He was glad to have the honor of extending a hearty welcome to the delegates, and also to know that it had reached its teens, and was still growing vigorously. His Worship closed his address with an earnest appeal that everybody stand by Prince Edward Island and the British flag.

The reply to this address of welcome was made by Mrs. George MacDonald of Cornwall, who expressed in appropriate words the thanks of the delegates for all the courtesies they were receiving at the hands of the citizens and the Board of Trade of Charlottetown.

Dr. Ledwell gave an interesting address in which he dealt with the establishment and growth of St. Vincent's Orphanage. He made an appeal for public support on behalf of that institution, and he said that the government should contribute a substantial grant to both orphanages each year.

The program included original readings by Mrs. W. E. Fletcher and Miss Lucy Blanchard, an entertaining reading by Dr. George Green, and step dancing by Miss Pansy Haynes. All these services were heartily enjoyed.

In closing the chairman asked that the Institutes be represented at the annual meeting of the Associated Boards of Trade in Charlottetown. He also made reference to the loss the Institute was sustaining in the resignation of the Provincial Supervisor, Miss Helen Mathieson, and his suggestion the audience joined heartily in singing "For She's A Jolly Good Fellow."
