RECOUNTS FOR THE ARMY

Interesting Interview With Major Dent, the Imperial Officer Who is Making Purchases.

Montreal, June 22.—The direct financial benefit which is being derived by the Provinces of Quebec and Ontario from the war in South Africa is shown by the fact that the Telfer & Climie Company, of St. Sacrament and Inspector Streets, sold to the British army no less than 1,028 horses, which approximate in value from \$120,000 to \$125,000. Mr. George Climie, the manager of the company, says that a very large proportion of these horses came from the neighborhood of Montreal—Sherbrooke, Cowansville and Granby. These are mostly small cobs from 11-12 to 15-12 hands high. That Canada can furnish an almost unlimited number of remounts is quite certain. Major-General Strange, an excellent authority, who recently devoted an article in the London Morning Post to the question, and who will be remembered as having taken a prominent part in the Northwest Rebellion of 1884-5, said:—"I see in the Morning Post that the British Government has purchased 50,000 horses in the State of New York at an average price of \$100 each. They could have got more serviceable horses for less money from Canada, especially from the prairie country, which produces the hardiest horses in the world. The veldt and the prairie are synonymous. The broncho will live on sun-dried grass, where the civilized horses starve. At the conclusion of the Canadian campaign of 1885 the late General Ravenhill, R. H. A., visited the Canadian ranches and bought horses for the British army, as his successor, Col. Goldie, also did. They were reported on most favorably for several years in succession. Eventually the London Horse Dealers' and Horse Breeders' Association got members of Parliament to bring pressure on the War Office, and the purchase of horses in Canada for the army was ordered to be discontinued."

Major Dent, who left Montreal for the west a couple of days ago, says that he could not altogether agree with Major-General Strange as to the desirability of range horses for remounts in the army, as they were for the most part bad-tempered intractable and too much time was consumed in fitting them for active service. He said the horses he has seen today were decidedly the best he had inspected, and he liked them on account of their docility and good temper. The horses have all been bred and raised on farms and taught to work, and are particularly fitted to the work for which they are intended. The method adopted by Major Dent was entirely different from any of his predecessors who had gone around the country. He went directly to the dealers who knew the business, and where the horses could be procured, with the result that he had been phenomenally successful in securing nearly 2,000 so far, most of which have been shipped. Major Dent advances the opinion that the Government should purchase suitable stallions, and by giving consues to the farmers, encourage the purchase of the proper animals to mate with them, so that a breed of horses suitable for the British army would result. His idea as to the proper kind of stallion would be a thoroughbred of the proper conformation, not necessarily a race horse, and he would restrict the breeding to mares of the better class. The stallions should be distributed under Government supervision, and then the Imperial Government would undoubtedly establish a remount supply depot, where an unfailing supply of remounts could be obtained. That Major Dent has done a great service to the country, not only financially, but has been the means of introducing Canada as a field in a most practical manner from which remounts can be supplied, there is no doubt.

AT THE MERCY OF THE WINDS.

The Newfoundland Schooner Nelly Had a Fearful Experience in a Hurricane. Philadelphia, June 20.—The schooner Nelly, just arrived here, had a thrilling experience. She belonged to St. John's, Nfld., and was abandoned at sea. The story told by the rescued is one of suffering and privation. The Nelly left Barbados on May 20. All went well until June 4 when a severe hurricane was encountered. For three days the little schooner of only 183 tons was at the mercy of the winds. Her decks were swept clean, not a single mast being left standing. In addition, all provisions on board were ruined. On June 10, the steamer Shenandoah was sighted, but the seas ran so high she was unable to launch a boat. She stood by all day, but when the morning of the 11th broke, she had disappeared. Reduced to almost actual starvation, Capt. Baxter ordered a pet donkey of his daughter's killed. It was about to be executed, when the Maryland hove in sight. The weather had moderated somewhat, and boat was sent to the schooner. All on board, including the donkey, were transferred to the Maryland.
