### Ranger's 6-4 Victory Dashes Toronto Hopes

TORONTO, Feb. 27. (CP)—Edgar Laprade scored three goals tonight to lead the last and New York Rangers to a 6-4 National Hockey League victory over Toronto.

The defeat leaves the fifth place Leafs, Stanley Cup winners a year ago, virtually no hope of qualifying for the play-offs this season.

Laprade, rookie centre from Port Arthur, was the kingpin of the New York team, scoring home two first period goals to start the Rangers on the victory trail and he added his third in the last half minute of play with a lacy well-aimed shot from outside the blue line with the Toronto goal unoccupied.

Brains Defeat Canadiens 5-3

MONTREAL, Feb. 27. (CP)—Boston Bruins tonight defeated the league-leading Montreal Canadiens 5-3 in a rough National Hockey League game played before a raucous crowd of more than 12,000 fans.
