BELGIAN CHILDREN GIVEN HOLIDAYS IN HOLLAND

AMSTERDAM—According to the Nethvok, the Belgian committee at the Hague which provides a short holiday in Holland for poor children of Belgium, has been informed by the German authorities that children under twelve years of age will not be permitted to leave Belgium.

The Telegraaf says batches of German children are arriving in Holland daily. Two hundred arrived Saturday, and eight hundred are expected shortly.

FLAG PRICES TOO HIGH

WASHINGTON—The Federal Trade Commission today recommended that Congress take up immediately the "extortionate" prices which it is all the public against "indefensible and extortionate" prices which it is alleged, are being charged for some commodities, the demand for which had been increased greatly because of the entrance of the United States into the war. The Commission based its charges on an investigation into the tremendous increase in the price of flags, which it was hinted, had approached a national scandal so far as some manufacturers and dealers were concerned.

WHAT EXECUTIONER OF CHARLES I. RECEIVED.

LONDON—June 1649 was the day on which Richard Brandon, official executioner for the City of London, died, says the Dunder "Advertiser." Tradition has it that he decapitated Charles I. and was paid \$150 for his pains, all in half-crowns, within half an hour after the deed. He is also reported to have been presented with an orange stuck full of cloves and a handkerchief out of the king's pocket as soon as he was carried from the scaffold. Brandon was at once offered 20 shillings for the orange, but he refused this sum, and afterward received 10 shillings in a market thoroughfare. In the burial register of Whitechapel there may be seen the following entry under 1649:

"June 21—Richard Brandon, a man out of Rosemary Lane. This Richard Brandon is supposed to have cut off the head of Charles I."

Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations

THE sole head of a family or any male over eighteen years of age, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency but not Sub-Agency on certain conditions.

Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. Homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section along side his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre.

Duties—Six months residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent; not less than 50 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions.

A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$300.

The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.

RIGHT IN STOPPING IRON ORE EXPORTS

LONDON—Lord Robert Cecil, the Minister of Blockade, emphasized in an interview with the American Associated Press today the vital importance to the Allies of stopping the trade in iron ore and wood pulp which the Scandinavian countries now are carrying on with Germany.

"You ask me," said Lord Robert, "if the United States is justified in threatening the Scandinavian countries with a stoppage of food supplies unless the ore trade is stopped, I have no question at all that the United States is entitled to act. Whether your country will be justified in so doing is a question which will have to be decided at Washington."

Certainly it seems here that the United States were properly may ask Sweden whether she wants American products to much that she is willing to forego her profits on trade with Germany.

"Iron ore and wood pulp traffic between Scandinavia and Germany is so important that it is hard to overestimate it. Our military and naval people tell me that without Swedish iron German munition factories would be in a very awkward position. Sweden is exporting directly to Germany the fundamental materials for shells to kill our soldiers and yours."

"It certainly would be a great mistake to neglect any step which might put a halt to a traffic which means, every tone of it, the loss of Allied lives."
