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HILLSBORO BRIDGE OF WHICH SIX SPANS HAVE UP TO THE PRESENT TIME BEEN PLACED IN POSITION; PANORAMIC VIEW FROM P. W. COLLEGE

THE WORK ON HILLSBORO BRIDGE IS FAST ENDING

In Several Weeks More the Men Will Lay off for the Winter. The Principal Part Has Been Completed—Six Spans Placed—Next Season Will Witness the Opening of the Bridge and Railway to Traffic.

With the end of November the season's work on the Hillsboro Bridge will have nearly reached its conclusion and in a few more days the operations will have been suspended for the winter. At the present time the abutment on the southern end of the bridge is fast being filled in with clay and work there is being carried on with all possible haste under the supervision of Theodore Knowlton, the popular superintendent of this year of that branch of the bridge construction. It is expected that the clay will be filled in by two weeks' time if the weather holds fine for that period. Of the eleven stationary spans that are to be placed on the piers, six have been put in position, and the work on the remainder will be proceeded with early in the spring. Hugh

McDonald, Sydney, who has the contract of placing the superstructure has been fortunate thus far in performing his work and no accidents of a serious nature have taken place. The construction here has been in charge of his son Frank P. McDonald. The work of constructing and placing the swinging span is to be done by the Hillsboro Bridge Company and this also will occupy the early part of next summer. It has not as yet been decided what motive power will be used in opening the swing for vessels and steamers passing through but it is probable that a gas engine will be utilized. The greater part of the operations on the piers during the past summer has consisted in placing a coffer dam, readjusting the pier that had got slightly out of plumb, and filling in the part that had

been dredged out around the piers in order to remove the mud when the gissons were put in position during the previous summer. At the present time Contractor McDonald's men are engaged in placing the stays in connection with the spans that have been put in position during the fall months. The northern approach is now entirely completed with the exception of the trimming and rounding off that will be done in the spring. When the work commences in 1905 it will likely be rushed as much as possible and it is expected that the whole line will be in operation by next July. The planking of the bridge will be the largest part of next season's work.

PRELIMINARY HEARING IS ALMOST CONCLUDED

In the Case Against Michael Power at the Police Court. Little New Evidence Adduced but it is Contradictory in Details.

Another session in the preliminary trial of Michael Power charged with murder of Harriet Warren was held yesterday. The prisoner who has been falling fast looked much more sickly than on previous occasions. The first witnesses were Maggie Robinson and Mrs. Kelly. The former told the same story as at the preliminary trial about discovering the body and Mrs. Kelly thought unable positively to recognize Doiron as the man who passed her, thought he was similar in appearance.

She was sure, however, the man had passed her to the north of the Power house and not to the south as Doiron and Moellette said. Mrs. Hennessey, who is a sister of Michael Power, Sr., testified that the latter had come to her house about a quarter to eight the night of the murder. She noticed nothing extraordinary about the prisoner. She heard nothing of the murder till about eleven when her son Eddie came in. It was not spoken of at all while Powers were in the house. She noticed absolutely no change in Power's condition from the night he came home. Powers left about a quarter to nine. Albert Moellette had Henry Doiron stand up before him in Court. Witness

TORPEDO LAUNCH WAS BLOWN UP

In Yesterday's British Naval Manoeuvres—Shock Sinks Another Launch—Mine Suspected.

TORPEDO LAUNCH BLOWN UP.

PORTSMOUTH, ENG. Nov. 28.—[Special]—While participating in the naval manoeuvres today a launch from a torpedo destroyer suddenly blew up and sank immediately.

TWO DROWNED, OTHERS INJURED.

The majority of the crew were rescued with the greatest difficulty and two members of the crew were drowned and several others seriously injured.

ANOTHER LAUNCH SUNK.

Another launch which was near by was so damaged by the explosion that she sank, but without loss of life.

WAS THERE A MINE.

The cause of the accident is unknown, but the launch either struck a mine or her boiler exploded.

A great deal of latitude, as was their right. He felt that it was time however that the investigation was closed.

In reply to the Magistrate's question as to whether he could give assurances of material evidence if a further remand were given Mr. Weeks replied that the Crown was endeavoring to secure some material evidence from abroad which it was not in the interest of public justice at present to disclose.

The prisoner was further remanded for a week. Michael Power, Jr. was then charged with having, on July 12, 1893, beaten Thomas Taylor with a spade while in the discharge of his duty. THE BALLOT BOX CONSPIRACY

Shibley Fled to the States Fearing to Face the Music—Ruttan Bailed—No Bail for Riley Who Weeps Bitterly—Belief that Lott May Forfeit His Bail—More Warrants Issued.

SHIBLEY HAS FLED.

KINGSTON, Nov. 28.—[Special]—It has been learned that Shibley left the country last Monday night and crossed the St. Lawrence river from Gananoque to Clayton, N. Y.

ON A BUSINESS TRIP.

On Monday afternoon he was at Harrowsmith and left word he was compelled to go away on a business trip.

HAD INTENDED TO APPEAR.

It is said up to Monday he intended to appear at the hearing of the conspiracy case at Belleville, but when P. J. Reilly came back from Ottawa determined to face the music and make an open breast of the affair, he changed his mind.

FOUND IT DANGEROUS.

Shibley then saw it was extremely dangerous for him to remain. It is understood that Shibley is at present in Boston.

BILLEVILLE MOVED TO TEARS.

MAY FORFEIT HIS BAIL.

The impression prevails that B. O. Lott will not turn up tomorrow when his bail expires. It amounts to \$1,000, \$2,000 in himself and two sureties of \$1,000 each.

ONLY FOUR ARRESTED.

So far only four parties have been arrested in connection with the case, Byron O. Lott, Whalen, Reilly and Ruttan.

MORE WARRANTS ISSUED.

Magistrate Flint however has issued two new warrants in connection with the conspiracy case.

He refuses to give the names of the parties for whom the warrants were issued but it is learned one is for Samuel Harryet, Police Magistrate at Bancroft.

TEN AMERICAN VESSELS SEIZED

By Domininn Steamer Curlew for Poaching—Largest Seizure Yet—Each Will Pay \$400 Fine.

FISHING VESSELS SEIZED.

EASTPORT, ME., Nov. 28.—[Special]—Ten American fishing vessels have been seized by the Canadian cruiser Curlew and fined for illegal fishing in the Canadian tributary of Passamaquoddy Bay.

THE CHARGES AGAINST THEM.

Additional charges are, Sunday fishing and having illegally caught the fish in their possession.

FINES WILL BE PAID.

The fines imposed were four hundred dollars each, and these will be paid with further complications.

FISH WERE VERY SCARCE.

This is the most extensive seizure made for illegal fishing in years and it is alleged that as sardine fishing ends on Wednesday and as the fish are scarce these vessels were induced to violate the law.
