ISAAC COOK Isaac Cook, 76 years old, was found dead by his grandson Earl E. Whitney, with whom he lived at 32 West Green Street, Lynn, Mass. Medical Examiner Nathaniel P. Breed was called and he pronounced death due to hardening of the arteries. He had been in apparently good health on Monday. He was born in Gaysboro, Co., N. S., Jan. 16th, 1845, a son of James W. and Sarah Ann (Bears) Cook. He went to Belle River, Lot 62, P.E.I., with his parents when he was a child. He married Susanna, daughter of the late Captain Bond Bears of Belle River and conducted a blacksmith's business there up to 20 years ago, when he went to Lynn, Mass., where he went into the carpentering and housepainting business from which he retired five years ago. He died only last July, resulting from a pleuritic shock. He leaves a daughter of the late Mr. Perle of Murray Harbour and was deservedly respected by a host of friends and acquaintances.
