(From Saturday's Evening Guardian) (Special by Phone.) ALBERTON, Feb. 8.-One of the foxes of the \$20,000 pair stolen from Barbours' Guard and Carruthers' Ranch at Bloomfield last Wednesday night has been recovered.

They were returned to the ranch last night by parties so far unknown. They were left in a bag outside the ranch. When discovered this morning one had eaten a hole in the bag and escaped. The other had its head out and was caught by sheer luck.

A number of men with fox hounds are endeavoring to catch the one at large.

The return of the foxes is attributed to the vigilance of a number of men with bloodhounds who were put on the trail, and constables with search-warrants discovered traces which would almost warrant arrest.

They were given to understand that the foxes would be returned last night.

Arrests of the suspected are expected today.-A.

LATER. The escaped fox was captured this afternoon in the woods where it had been left in a bag with its mate. It was caught without injury. No arrests of the parties suspected of the theft have yet been made.

(LATEST) In connection with the recovery of the above foxes The Guardian learns that all the credit is due to W. D. White of Alberton. The fact was reported to Mr. White and he at once got to work on the case and through his untiring efforts brought pressure to bear on certain prospective parties who directed him to the place where the foxes were found, which was about two miles from the ranch and not at the ranch as above stated.
