WOMEN'S HAIR.

An English View of How it Should Be Cared For—Excellent Advice for Its Treatment—A Good Shampoo.

The average healthy woman's hair is healthy. It may be abundant, or it may lack luxury; that will depend primarily upon the texture of the tresses, for hair that is coarse looks six times as abundant as hair that is fine. Physiologists say that it is a matter of temperament and character, and try to console the woman whose crown of glory is so fine that it makes no show at all with the information that she is the most refined of mortals mentally and morally. But be its quantity what it may, the hair of a healthy woman is healthy. Only it must be cared for systematically to keep it at its best beauty. An illness will spoil its splendor temporarily, but a physician's treatment will restore it to its pristine excellence. Time after time I have noted fresh vitality and new growth, the burnished gloss that is an unmistakable sign of bodily vigor, and a renewal of the rich, natural tints of the hair, result from a course of treatment for impaired health directed by the family physician. For instance, a long and persistence absorption of iron taken internally as a tonic under a doctor's directions will brighten and color the hair and often prevent early grayness, since the pith of the hair owes its pigment or tint to the iron in the system. Such a prescription is composed of two and a half grains of iron sulphate and one and a half grains of potassium carbonate, made into pills, one to be taken after each meal three times a day, increasing the dose to three after the principal meals of each day.

An excellent shampoo for the hair is made in these proportions. Take the yolk of one egg, a pint of warm rain-water, and one ounce of spirits of rosemary. Beat up the mixture thoroughly and use it while it is warm, rubbing it well into the scalp. Rainwater is so soft and satin-like that that is why it is recommended, for the hair abhors anything that impoverishes its vitality, so it should be sought for, especially in those parts of the country where the water is naturally hard, but if it cannot be obtained, borax should be added to the ordinary water to soften it, or boiled water should be used. Another excellent shampoo is composed of two ounces of soap, the juice of one lemon, the yolk of one egg, and half a pint of rain or distilled or boiled water. Place the soap and the water in a clean saucpan and stir the water over the fire until the soap is melted. Beat the yolk of the egg and the lemon juice together, pour the soap and water on it, stirring it briskly, and when it is cold bottle it for use.

Girls with a luxuriant crop of hair will find that they will require if they use eggs only as a shampoo seven or eight, and plenty of rain or softened water. The way to use eggs alone is to dip the fingers into the yolks and to massage the scalp with the finger tips, repeating this process with shampoo of warm water between each, for three or four courses. Egg shampoos are particularly useful for greasy hair, and ensure a very nice, fluffy and well-burnished crown of glory as a result, without any of that dry appearance that sometimes ensues after washing the head. As every head, even the healthy one, is sometimes subject to dandruff, I shall do well to add here a prescription for its cure. It is made of 48 grains of arsenic, one-fourth of an ounce of glycerine, and half an ounce of rectified spirit, and water till two-ounce bottle. Pour a little of this mixture into a saucer each night, dip the finger tips in it, and massage the scalp, rubbing it well into the head with the finger tips. Or a dropper may be fixed instead of a cork into the bottle and a little sprinkled over the head, followed by a massage of the finger tips. It is impossible to exaggerate the excellent effects of scalp massage with the finger tips for every head, be it healthy or not. There is virtue in the finger tips, and the head, benefits by massage quite as much as the face or body, which is a fact few people realize. Moreover, it is a quick process for busy people. Five minutes' massage every night will work wonders. Brushing is simply splendid for the head if someone else does it. Failing a maid, I think a massage performed by one's self is just as efficacious.

Girls with hair that is too dry should massage it every other night with a little oil, using odorless castor oil if their hair is inclined to be thin or weak in any way, cocoa butter for the same species of hair, or pure olive oil or almond oil. Very little should be taken up by the finger tips, and the long tresses of hair need not be touched by it at all. Girls who possess very fluffy locks are generally inclined to be proud of them, but dry hair is well known to change color more quickly than hair with a certain amount of natural moisture in it, and, if this natural moisture is lacking it should be added and cultivated.
