OWING to the illness of the Rev. Dr. Price, of Tryon, the contemplated pulpit exchange with the Rev. G. P. Raymond, of this city, will not take place.

REV. CLARENCE MCKINNON and wife left Middle Stewiacke, N. S. Monday, April 10. Mr. McKinnon is going away for a short holiday before entering upon his new duties in Halifax. Mr. McKinnon is well known here.

WHEN Dr. J. H. Ayers reached his office yesterday morning he found that the lock of his door had been tampered with by some one, evidently intent on burglarizing. Mr. McKay has labored during the last twelve years in three-fourths of all the Presbyterian churches in Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island, besides working for Y. M. C. The Presbytery of P. E. Island met on the 13th inst., in the church at Hampton at 2 p.m. Mr. D. B. McLeod, Moderator pro tempore, with whom were present: Messrs. Mal. Campbell, Geo. Millar, T. F. Fullerton, Ministers; and Messrs. J. J. McLeod, W. D. McLean, elders.

The edict of induction was returned as served, and was again read, after which Presbytery proceeded to the induction of Mr. G. C. Robertson.

Mr. D. B. McLeod conducted public worship, preaching from Matt. 7:24-25. Mr. Millar narrated the steps, put the questions of the formula all of which were satisfactorily answered. Mr. Robertson was, then by prayer and the right hand of fellowship inducted into the pastoral charge of Hampton, Tryon and Bonshaw. Messrs. Fullerton and Campbell addressed the minister and people on their respective duties.

It was agreed to license Messrs. Coffin and Ross at a public service to be held in St. James' church, Charlottetown, on the evening of Tuesday, May 9th, the moderator of Presbytery to preside and license, Mr. E. C. Robertson to preach, Mr. T. F. Fullerton to address the newly licensed students, Mr. D. B. McLeod to address the people on missions.

The Presbytery then adjourned to meet in St. James' Hall, Charlottetown, on Tuesday, May 9th.
