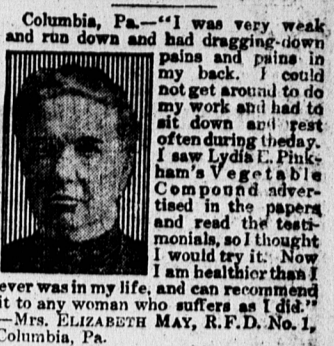
Military Medal For Valleyfield Boy



Pte. Alex. W. McLeod, M. M.

It is with great pleasure that the news is learned that Pte. Alex. W. McLeod, the only son of Mr. Angus N. McLeod, Valleyfield East has been awarded the Military Medal for gallant services in the field. The following is the text of the letter notifying him of the honor conferred upon him: Headquarters, 14th Canadian Battalion, Royal Montreal Regiment October 31st, 1918. 712302, Pte. A. McLeod, M. M., 14th Canadian Battalion, C/o Canadian Cross, 12, Berners Street, London, W. Dear McLeod:— I have much pleasure in enclosing herewith copy of the Special Order issued by the Fourth Army in appreciation of the gallant services rendered by yourself and other members of this unit during our successful advance in August last, and to extend the hearty congratulations of the Royal Montreal Regiment in the well deserved honor of the award of the Military Medal to you. I was indeed sorry to hear that you became wounded in a later engagement, but trust that you are meeting with a rapid recovery and will enjoy a pleasant convalescence. Yours faithfully, Dick Wordall, Lieut. Col., Commanding 14th Canadian Battalion. Pte. McLeod enlisted in November, 1915 with the 105th Batt., and went overseas to England in July, 1916. He was sent over to France with the first batch from the 105th in Dec, 1916 where he was transferred to the 14th Battalion. He was gassed in August, 1917 during the severe fighting of that month when the Canadians suffered so severely. He was taken to hospital in England where he remained till Nov., 1917 and then returned to the trenches again. From that time on he had been through all the fighting in which his regiment was engaged all he was wounded last Sept. through the bone in his left arm, half way between the wrist and the elbow with a machine gun bullet. He has been convalescing in England ever since. He has been in numerous raids on the German trenches and every time returned with spoils. And he has to his credit the never-to-be forgotten Canadian battles—Vimy Ridge, Passchendaele, Lens. The Guardian offers most hearty congratulations to his parents on the honor conferred on a son of which they have just reason to be proud. Pte. McLeod is coming home whenever he is able to travel.

A MERITED TRIBUTE.—A large number of the residents of Earnsccliffe and vicinity spent last Saturday evening in a most enjoyable way at the home of Mr. Houghton Mutch, in 1915 Houghton, and his friend Sydney McLeod, enlisted to go overseas; but being prevented by the force of circumstances over which they had no control of filling their hearts' desire to fight in defense of home and country on the battlefields of France, they did the next best thing and went on garrison duty to Fort Ives, Halifax. Not discouraged by the failure of their first attempt to get to France, these two brave boys tried short exam on the religious teaching imparted to them during the year, get overseas to fight side by side with their fellow Islanders in defence of Freedom and Justice. But all to no avail, and they had to be content to remain at Halifax where, until the end of the war, they fulfilled their highly important but very arduous and exacting duties loyally, faithfully and well. And so, on Saturday evening, the boys' friends in Earnsccliffe and vicinity waited upon them at Mr. Mutch's and presented them with an address, in which they expressed their hearty appreciation of the boys' faithful services in their country's interests at Halifax, and paid a merited tribute to their patriotism and great nobility of character. At the conclusion of the reading of the address Mr. John Tweedy came forward and on behalf of the boys' friends presented them with a twenty dollar gold piece each for them to keep as a souvenir of remembrance of the friends whose good will and good wishes would be theirs all through life. Mr. Mutch and Mr. McLeod in brief speeches heartily thanked their friends for their kind words and gifts which they would treasure while they lived.

SUCCESSFUL DAIRY MEETING.—The Annual Meeting of the Kensington Dairying Association took place in the Temperance Hall on Tuesday, January 21st, at 2 p. m., the President C. M. Howatt presiding. The meeting was well attended and most enthusiastic throughout. The reports of the President and Secretary showed that the business of the past year was among the best in the history of the Association. The milk supplied was 3,216,901 lbs which made 298,553 lbs cheese and sold for \$68,667.19. Quantity of milk with average test 3.45 required to make 1 lb cheese was 10.77 lbs. price paid per 100 lbs milk \$1.816. The highest amounts received were Gordon Hues \$1,698.27, C. M. Howatt, 694.51, C. C. Baker, \$693.96, William L. Johnson, \$676.59. A comparison of reports given by the Secretary showed that the amount received by five patrons of this year equalled the amount received by 91 patrons twenty-five years ago.
