IN S'SIDE

The Crystals are Again Victorious.

THE HOTTEST GAME

Ever Played in the Western Capital — The Scores Made.

Three cheers for the Red White and Blue told the story to nearly all of Summerside last night and the sound echoed through the air. The Crystal Hockey Club of Summerside met the Victorias of Charlottetown in Crystal Rink in the fifth struggle of the series, and proved to the Vics that this game would not decide to whom the trophy would go. Had the latter won, the question would have been settled, but the final game will yet have to be played between the Crystals and Abergweits.

The rink was crowded with spectators including about 80 from Charlottetown, and lovers of the game from the surrounding country were greatly in evidence. Summerside turned out with strong hopes that their favorite club would still hold the honor and trophy won last season.

The game began at 8.15 and was from the start, the hottest ever played in Summerside. For some time the Victorias' defence was the hardest part of it, the Crystals' forwards putting up a strong play. Many good stops were made by the Victorias' goal and points, as the Crystals shot fast and often. Body-checking was much indulged in, the light weight forwards of the Crystals fearing not the Victorias' heavy cover point. It was a continuous struggle and seldom did any one player get control of the puck. The game was between the Crystals' forwards and the Vic's defence and rarely did the rubber get beyond the ever faithful MacDonald. At five minutes before half time Cushing received a cut on the back of his head which caused a delay of about six minutes and in one minute more the Crystals scored the first goal. There was no change at half time. Crystals 1, Vics 0.

It was but one minute after play was resumed that the Crystals shot another goal. Courage was not lacking with the Summerside team, now and at intervals the boys on the promenade rendered assistance by singing the Red White and Blue. The Vics were now getting their mad up and many times their cover point was working with the forwards. It was 13 minutes after the start that the Vics made their first score. The fight increased in violence and at times it was hard to follow the little piece of rubber which was being carried alternately from one end of the rink to the other. In about three minutes more the Vics made the score 2-2.

So elated were the Vics' friends on the promenade that a few of them jumped down upon the ice shouting and waving hands and sticks after a threatening scrimmage they were soon put off and the play was resumed.

The excitement got up to a fever heat and between a desperate game on the ice and mad enthusiasm on the promenade the roof fairly lifted. There is no mistake about it the play got exceedingly rough; combination was out of the question. It was principally a test of muscle. Time was fast ebbing away and one goal would now probably give the Vics the trophy, but it was not to be so. The Crystals shot and Summersiders went wild. The minutes were now being counted. There was three to go and Green made a capital shot and then the goals were counted. Crystals 3, Victoria 2.

Roy McDonald played cover point on the Crystals which was the only change in the personnel of the teams.

There is little to note in the Intermediate games. The play was quite slow and interest was lacking. At half time neither team had scored.

In the second half the Crystals placed three to their credit and thus it stood. Crystals 3; Victorias 0.
