—SCHOOL INSPECTOR.—Acting  
Superintendent Shaw and Inspector  
Gallant paid a visit to Abrams's Vil-  
lage school last Thursday. The pupils  
of the three departments were exam-  
ined and apparently the examiners  
were favourably impressed. The  
trustees were present as were also  
some ratepayers. Remarks of satis-  
faction were made by trustees and  
ratepayers and, also by the Superin-  
tendent who gave some valuable ad-  
ditions to the pupils. Referring to  
the need of education the Superin-  
tendent said that the playground of a  
school came in for a large part in the  
education of a child. The aim of edu-  
cation was to develop the pupil phys-  
ically, mentally, and what was the  
most important, the formation of  
character. He cited notable instances  
where, physical and intellectual strength,  
alone, were a menace to civilization.  
What was an absolute necessity  
was the force of character, which  
consisted in being courageous, sym-  
pathetic and self-denial. He then  
went on to show how well organized  
games in the play ground, and well  
conducted, tended to bring about  
those desired qualities.—M

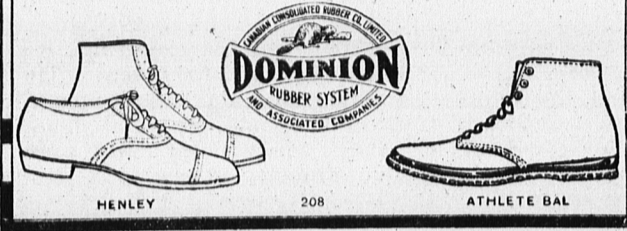

#### WHY BRITISH STOPPED RESCUING CREW OF GERMAN DESTROYER.

Impudent Charge of Inhumanity Made  
by the Murderer of Babes and  
Women.

LONDON, June 15.—An Admiralty  
communication was issued this evening  
concerning allegation made in  
German wireless despatch charging  
inhumanity on the part of the British  
in failing to rescue more men of the  
crew of the German torpedo-boat de-  
stroyer S-20, which was sunk by the  
British squadron in its attack on the  
German naval base at Ostend June  
5. The communication explains that  
the British officer engaged in the re-  
scue found that the S-20 had her tor-  
pedo tube trained on his vessel,  
while three enemy seaplanes were  
overhead, which apparently were a-  
bout to drop bombs. It says also that  
the British rescuing vessel was under  
fire from the shore batteries and that  
the officer therefore ceased rescuing  
the Germans when seven of them had  
been picked up, as nothing further

could be done and grave risks already  
had been secured for the sake of hum-  
anity.
