After a dainty lunch was served by the younger ladies, the large gathering, in the light, fantastic to the strains of music furnished by the Summerside Orchestra. H.


NOVELTIES IN SEALING WAX

It's simply amazing the number of fascinating articles that can be made out of sealing wax. You can obtain separate sticks of sealing wax in a variety of colors and produce some very delightful work with the very simplest means. Bridge pencils are always in demand, and the cheapest pencils can be turned into gay affairs with gaily colored wax. Here is how you do it. Heat the wax and let a drop fall on the top of the pencil. With the aid of a knitting pin make dents in the wax while it is still warm. In this way small flowers and leaves can be formed to decorate the pencils. A gay tassel is then tied to the top, or attached to a blob of sealing wax. White wax candles can be decorated in the same way, and they look charming indeed. Sealing wax work is also very attractive, for the wax when dissolved in methylated spirit, forms a liquid paint, and gives the appearance of expensive enamel work. Wooden cigarette boxes, photograph frames, odd glass jars and many other homely articles can be made most attractive by decorating them with this liquid wax. To dissolve the

Daily War Survey (By The Canadian Press)

Raids by the Finnish Air Force on military objectives behind the Russian lines recall the fact that some 30 or more Italian aircraft were rushed to Finland as soon as Russia began its attack.

Italy sent pilots and instructors with the aircraft and it is probable this substantial Italian gift is now being turned to account against the Red forces.

Italian aid for Finland naturally focuses attention on the relations between Italy and its axis partner, Germany. For Germany, at least implicitly, condones and supports the Russian attack on Finland. The prompt dispatch of Italian assistance for the Finns, shows, however, that whatever compromise Nazi Germany is prepared to make with Communist Russia, Italy will make none.

The Italian aircraft crossed Germany on the way to Finland but they flew non-stop. Germany made no attempt to stop them although some shipments of war material to Finland by rail are reported to have been stopped in Germany.

While Nazis may regard the Russian adventure in Finland with a measure of coldness and may actually have tried to dissuade the Soviet authorities from starting it, now that it is under way it is in Germany's interest that Russia should triumph quickly.

A cessation of hostilities by the Russians until spring or later would be bad for the prestige of the Russo-German combination. A prolonged struggle with a Finland, reinforced by liberal outside assistance would

TORONTO, Dec. 29.—(CP)—More than a dozen new high prices for the year were registered on the Toronto exchange in today's trading, the majority of them appearing in the industrial share department. Base metal shares came into the picture in the last hour and the index for the group advanced 85. Golds closed 32 up, industrials 19 up and the western oils were down 19 at the finish. Volume was comparatively heavy at 692,000 shares.

Four new highs for the year in the food group affected Fanny Farmer, Consolidated Bakeries, Honey Dew and Canada Vinegars. Fanny Farmer advanced to 27 1/4 and closed at 27 for a gain of 1-2. Consolidated Bakeries had the same gain and Honey Dew firmed 1 1/4 to 17 1/2.

Nickel firmed 3-4 to 45 1-2 and smaller gains came out for Smelters, Noranda and Hudson Bay. Royaltie and Home improved slightly and Okalta and Calgary-Edmonton finished 3 to 6 cents lower.

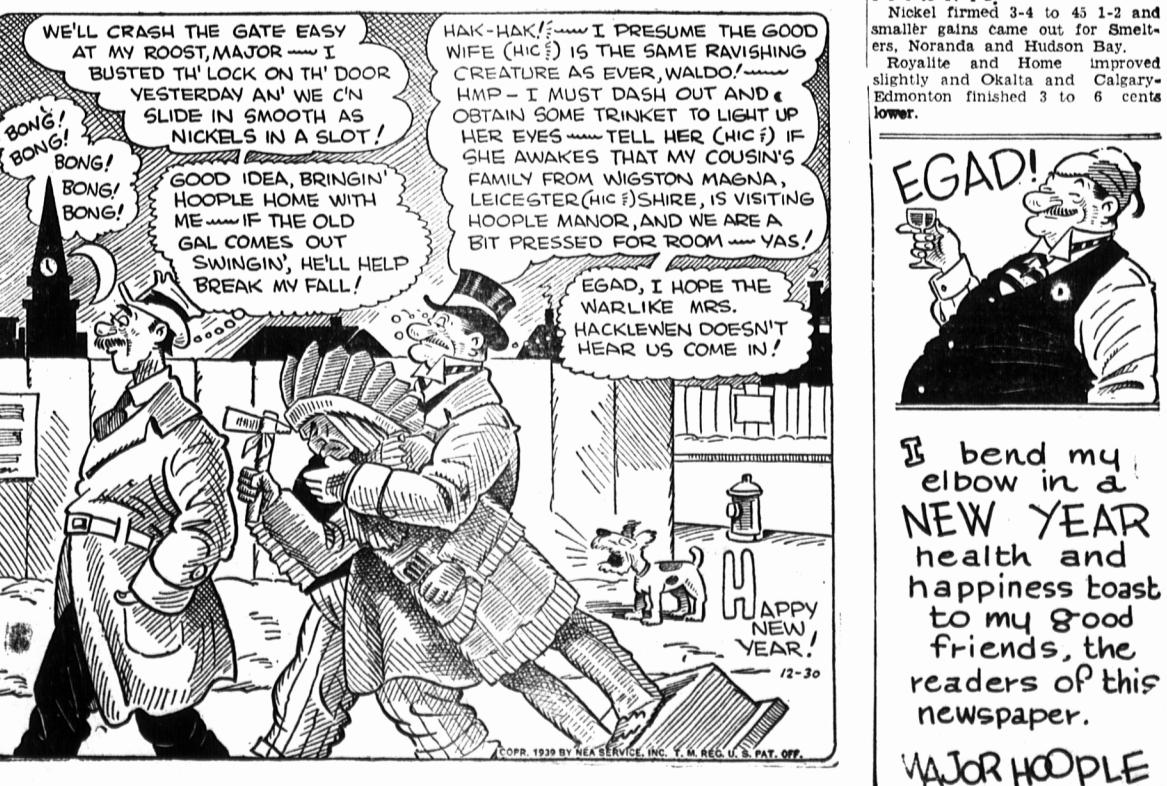
