MARITIME TURF RECORDS FOR 1905

The Fastest Horses in Different Classes—The Principal Money Winners--Phoebon W. Has Fastest Mile.

The Halifax Recorder recently presented its readers with its annual summary of fastest records on Maritime Province tracks, which shows, while there has been some splendid performances, both the best trotting and pacing records remain as before.

Phoebon W. again has the fastest mile to his credit, 2:12, which time he made twice at Moncton and once at Chatham. Phoebon started in eight races in the provinces this season, winning six, and losing at St. John and Halifax, his total winning amounting to \$880. Simassie, driven by Frank Boutiller, Halifax, was again his chief opponent, they meeting seven times, the gelding winning on five occasions. Simassie, however, won more money than the gelding; she was in ten races during the season, having four firsts, and four seconds to her credit and won \$1,040. Czarina added to the interest of the free-for-alls, and her total earnings reached \$550.

For the first time since the importation of horses for the free-for-alls have commenced, a horse brought to the province without a record has won one of these races. Lady Bingen, at Fredericton. This mare was brought here by Mr. Cowans last year, and without a record she was placed in the hands of Fred Warren, who last season gave her a mark of 2:22 and at her race at Fredericton this season, driven by assistant trainer Charles Sigman, she obtained a record of 2:14. Mr. Cowans has always had an ambition to develop a free-for-aller, and now that this has been accomplished, he will dispose of the mare which he imported for this class—Czarina, 2:12. Lady Bingen had a most

successful year, winning five races, and a total amount of \$1,000. The fastest-green performer of the year is Lady Patton, also owned by the Spring Hill Stables. She did not start until Aug. 30, when at Springhill she obtained a record of 2:21 in her first race, and within five weeks she competed in eleven races, winning seven, second in three, and third in one, and obtained a record of 2:17. She is also the largest money winner of the year on the provincial turf, her winnings totalling \$1,420.

The fastest new stallion, as well as the fastest four-year-old, is Will Be Sure, owned by Nat McNair Port Louison, N. B. He is also the second fastest green horse of the year, and the second among the list of winners, his figures being \$1,170. He started eight times, won six races; one each second and third, and got a record of 2:19.

The fastest newcoomer among the geldings was Parker L., 2:20, also owned by the Springhill Stables. He won six races, his total winning being \$945.

The fastest green trotter of the year was May Parkside, handled by Frank Boutiller, and it is a great pleasure to note that she was bred in the provinces. She won races at Moncton and Woodstock, obtaining a record of 2:21 and during the year won \$650 in premiums.

The fastest trotting mare of the year Daisy DeWitt, was also in the Halifax stables. She took a mark of 2:21 in her race at Woodstock, and her season's winnings reached \$617.50.

The fastest province bred on the provincial turf this season was Ada Mae, having obtained a record of 2:17—a mark only beaten by free-for-alls. Her total winnings were \$512.50. She is by Parkside, who thus has to his credit the fastest province bred of the year; May Parkside, the fastest new trotter of the year, and he is also the grand sire of Parker L., the fastest green gelding of 1905.

Another province bred, Fleetstep, owned by Dr. Taylor, Moncton, divides the honors with Estill Boy, of the Springhill Stables, as the fastest trotter of the season, each having reduced their records to 2:19. The latter's winnings for the season reached \$510.

The fastest stallion of the season was Red Pepper, owned by W. J. Furbush, West Newton, Mass., who took a record of 2:17 at Chatham. Red Pepper's winnings in seven races were \$650. The fastest stallion owned in the provinces was Banito, owned by J. C. Larder, Sydney, with a mark of 2:18, also at Chatham. There were only a couple of trotting stallions on the provincial turf this season and we have no record of any of them winning a heat.

Among other good winners of the year were Rita Mac, E. Duncanson, Fairville, who stands sixth on the list with \$905; Ruth Wilkes, A. H. Learment, Truro, \$750; Rita M., P. Carrol, Halifax, \$607; General Fluke, E. R. Gahan, Boston, \$640; Claudia Hal, Springhill Stables, \$450; Joe Patehen, D. Lwyer, Pictou, \$445; Doncella, Dr. Gilchrist, Greenwick, N. B., \$405; Kremella F. Boutiller, Halifax, \$405; Bennet W., B. Whalen, River Hebert, \$400.

JUST HOW WE STAND.
