British Delegate To Good Roads Convention in May

MONTREAL, April 4.—It is more than probable that there will be a representative of the International Association of Road Congresses at the forthcoming Good Roads Association at Halifax on May 10th, 11th and 12th for secretary McNamara has been in correspondence with W. Tees Jeffreys of London, England, the secretary of the International Association, who is taking a keen interest in the growth of the good roads movement in the Dominion. If a representative does attend he will not only be present at the convention but will look over the possibilities of the Dominion with a view to the next gathering of the International Association of Road Congresses being held in Canada. Comprising as it does delegates from all parts of the world the International Association's visit to the Dominion would mark a milestone in the movement for improved highways on this side of the Atlantic and would have a far reaching effect.

On the opening day of the convention the visiting Rotarian delegates will be the guests of the Halifax Rotary Club at luncheon while the delegates generally will be the guests of the Nova Scotia Motor League on a drive around the wonderful coast of the province. At 5 o'clock the Lt. Governor of Nova Scotia will give an informal reception to the delegates at his residence.

The annual meeting and luncheon of the Canadian Automobile Association will be held on Wednesday, May 12th, while in the evening the annual dinner and informal entertainment of the Canadian Good Roads Assn. will be held at the Halifax Hotel. The general meeting for the election of officers taking place on the following evening. The officers and directors of the Association have been invited to luncheon on the 10th of May by the Commercial Club and a special conference of local and provincial good roads associations will take place that same afternoon under the chairmanship of president R. H. Murray of the N.S. Good Roads Assn.

Special Pullman car parties are being organized from Toronto and Ottawa as well as Montreal for the convention, who will be joined by delegates from Regina, Winnipeg, Edmonton and other western points. Mr. Squire and Mr. Kelly being at present in the west for the purpose of arousing interest in the convention and they report much enthusiasm at the prospect of visiting the Maritime provinces. A high day has been set apart for the trip through the Land of Evangeline, perhaps the most historic and famous part of the Maritime provinces and a magnet that attracts thousands of visitors every year. The delegates will leave by special train over the Dominion Atlantic Railway at 8.30 on the morning of May 13 and proceed to Wolfville or Kentville, the party being split in two so that luncheon may be given to the guests at two towns and then be driven in automobiles through the wonderful Gasperaux Valley and returning by motor to Grand Pré station and reaching Halifax in time for dinner. This is a trip they none should miss and will undoubtedly be an added incentive to many to attend the convention.

A feature of the convention will be the good roads exhibition which will be located next to the meeting hall and in which will be shown road materials, models etc with heavier road machinery on view in the rear of the college. During the sessions a number of moving picture films will be exhibited showing the actual construction of various types of road way by the department of public highways, Ontario, as well as scenic and other films of interest. The tentative program indicates that a majority of the subjects

that will be dealt with by experts from both sides of the line will have special application to road construction in the Maritime provinces, for they will deal with the local problems of gravel, carriages and clay roads and their proper construction and also the most efficient manner of maintaining them. The object of the Canadian Good Roads Assn. in its conventions, is to concentrate on the questions that most vitally affect the section of the Dominion in which the meetings are held, so that the delegates from the municipalities who have to grapple with local problems will be able to get the best advice on them and through the medium of the free discussion which will follow every paper or address and thus ascertain the best way to overcome the difficulties that confront them. The different methods of financing highway construction will also be discussed as well as the maintenance problems and road drainage.
