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Dramatic Story of Drift Across Ocean

(By The Canadian Press) PORT OF SPAIN, Trinidad, May 19 — A dramatic story of how eight fishermen drifted across the south Atlantic after their tiny craft developed engine trouble was told today by a Senegalese seaman.

Champ Denbar appeared in court on a charge of illegal entry. He was being held tonight for deportation.

For the first time reporters were able to talk to him today: "This was his story: With seven other men, he set sail from Dakar, French West Africa, on a fishing trip. Their tiny craft soon developed engine trouble and started to drift into the Atlantic.

High winds and storms battered the tiny boat and swept provisions overboard. Almost without hope the men clung to the ship. They lost count of the days.

Finally, the craft was swept ashore in Venezuela.

Here, Denbar, only Negro member of the crew, said the other seven men were allowed to go free. He was thrown into jail.

Later he escaped and made his way to Trinidad where he again was taken into custody as an illegal immigrant.

The magistrate who sentenced Denbar today to deportation said he felt it was an "inhuman practice" to bring shipwrecked men into the court.

At one point during his trial, Denbar suffered a fit and had to be taken from the courtroom on a stretcher.
