**Heart-to-Heart Talks With Automobile Owners and Drivers on How to Get the Most Out of Their Cars at the Least Expense.**

**SPRING CLEANING TIME**

Slip covers are being left on many closed car seats now throughout the entire year. The current season offers a splendid time to have them cleaned. They are destined to see their greatest usefulness in the period just ahead, and unless they are now the additional dirt will cause them to wear that much more quickly.

**BETTER FOR BEARINGS**

There are many cars still in service which provide for rear wheel bearing lubrication through grease cups located just inside the wheel at the hub. They are not especially accessible but this should not prevent the car owner from going after them. Higher engine powers have put a bigger burden on the bearings and they need the assistance of regular and adequate lubrication.

**INTERPRETING NOISES**

Valve and piston noises are difficult for some motorists to determine accurately. It is easier if one remembers that a valve taps or click while a piston makes a definite slapping noise.

**ABOUT LARGER VALVES**

Many of the later cars boast of valves of larger diameter. Their virtues with regard to performance are unquestioned. It is well for the motorist to know however, that the larger valve is more prone to warping. More precise adjustment at all times is one way to forestall such an eventuality.

**SUN RAYS ARE FOILED**

Putting the new tire into immediate service for a sufficient time to get it discolored makes it more resistant to the effects of the sun's rays. That is one good reason for changing the tires of a new car around a bit when the car is still new.

**OIL CAN PSYCHOLOGY**

Keeping the oil can and grease gun clean at all times, the motorist will find the temptation to use them greater. Anything that helps to keep the car lubricated is valuable.

**LEAVE NOZZLE ALONE**

It is a great deal easier to wash the car with a hose if the nozzle is left off entirely. The nozzle, regardless of the setting used, gives the water greater pressure than if it is allowed to flow unrestricted from the end of the hose. As little pressure as possible is the desirable thing. Besides, the task of car washing is less messy if the nozzle is removed from the hose.

Light bulbs packaged in neat sets for various cars are among the most popular of the current accessories. Now that they can be carried without danger of breakage they are well worth carrying as spares.

**WHY IS IT VENTED**
