Lord Clarendon Will Recommend The Maritimes

MONTREAL, Sept. 24.—That the Maritime Provinces offer excellent advantages for the English farm settler is the opinion of Lord Clarendon, Under Secretary of State for Dominion Affairs, who spent a few hours in Montreal yesterday, where he arrived after a week's tour of the section.

"I am greatly interested and impressed with the conditions in the Maritime Provinces," commented Lord Clarendon. He continued by stating that he was prepared to recommend them to English immigrants who were contemplating farming in Canada, but not in the west. They are closer to England, he said, and he believed that this was a big consideration for certain families. Among the 20 families which His Lordship and Major MacNaghton in Nova Scotia, there were none that could be classed as failures.

"Of course," the speaker continued, "there is a vast difference between the types of farming in the west and in the Maritimes, but the general training of the prospects receive stands them in good stead. Speaking of the British settler I believe that the country from which I have just come offers excellent advantages. A great deal depends, though, whether in the east or the west, on whether or not all the eggs are placed in one basket.

"By this I mean that it is essential that mixed farming be engaged in. This will be one of the things that we will encourage to the utmost, for we believe it to be vitally important to the success of the settler in Canada. And I think from what I have seen during my tour, that Canadian farmers are realizing the importance of mixed farming more and more," he stated.

There Is One Federal Unit a One-Man Affair

WASHINGTON, Sept. 24.—The boast that it is the one important unit of the government officially employing but one man is made by the Federal Power Commission.

O. C. Merrill, its executive secretary, is the employe. When outside help is needed it is borrowed from the War, Interior and Agricultural Departments, whose secretaries make up the commission. The commission has jurisdiction over power developments in the nation's waterways.

Six Killed in Train Collision

PARIS, Sept. 24.—Six persons were killed today when the Lyons express was in collision just outside the Hervey station of the Paris-Montereu line. Eighteen persons were injured. One of those killed was believed to be Eugene Montgomery, 21, an Englishman, while one of the unidentified bodies was believed to be that of his brother.

Sukiyaki Joins Rank Of Chop Suey Dishes

BOSTON, Sept. 25.—The American public long ago accepted chop suey, chow mein, and even foo young (with varied spellings) but sukiyaki has still to make itself known.

Boston has one Japanese restaurant, as against more than a score which serve Chinese dishes. Within the last three months its doors have thrown open to American trade—for such as can find it is on an ancient South end street where the houses still show the majestic fronts of the old days of fashion.

How It is Made.

The wife of the proprietor, a plump, rosy cheeked woman, greets the guest with ceremonious grace. Service is on a strictly Japanese dining room table.

If the main dish is to be sukiyaki, the table gas stove in the center is lighted and an iron frying pan set in place. With chopsticks the hostess deftly dabs the pan with a bit of pork fat and then heapes in it sliced onions, partially cooked string beans of vivid green, Japanese mushrooms, leaves of lettuce, sprouts of bamboo, squares of yellow bean cake, a bit of endive and then across the top lays strips of beef, veal or chicken sliced thin. A cup of soup stock is poured in to keep the whole moist, and a lacing of soy bean sauce and a sprinkling of sugar is added. Comes serving time, and the hostess flicks a raw egg in each person's bowl before dishing out the piping hot sukiyaki.

Then with an injunction to keep the remainder moistened and to stir and turn ingredients frequently, she disappears so as not to embarrass the guests in their struggle with chopsticks. Later she reappears bringing toasted cracker-cakes with a seaweed leaf wrapped about each as a special delicacy.

MONTREAL, Sept. 27.—Live stock receipts—Cattle receipts 1,419. Cattle prices were easier. Butcher steers sold up to \$6.50 with one lot averaging 1160 pounds at \$6.65 and ten choice steers picked out at \$7.00. The bulk of the good killing steers were sold around \$6.25 and medium and common steers brought from \$4.00 to \$5.75. Heavy branded cows were sold for \$5.00 and the same price was paid for a few lots of local cows some of which were bought for export very few if any y heifers brought more than \$5.75, \$5.70 to \$5.60 was the price for the majority of the better kinds and from \$4.00 to \$5.00 for the majority of the better kinds and from 4.00 to \$5.00 for the common and medium lots. 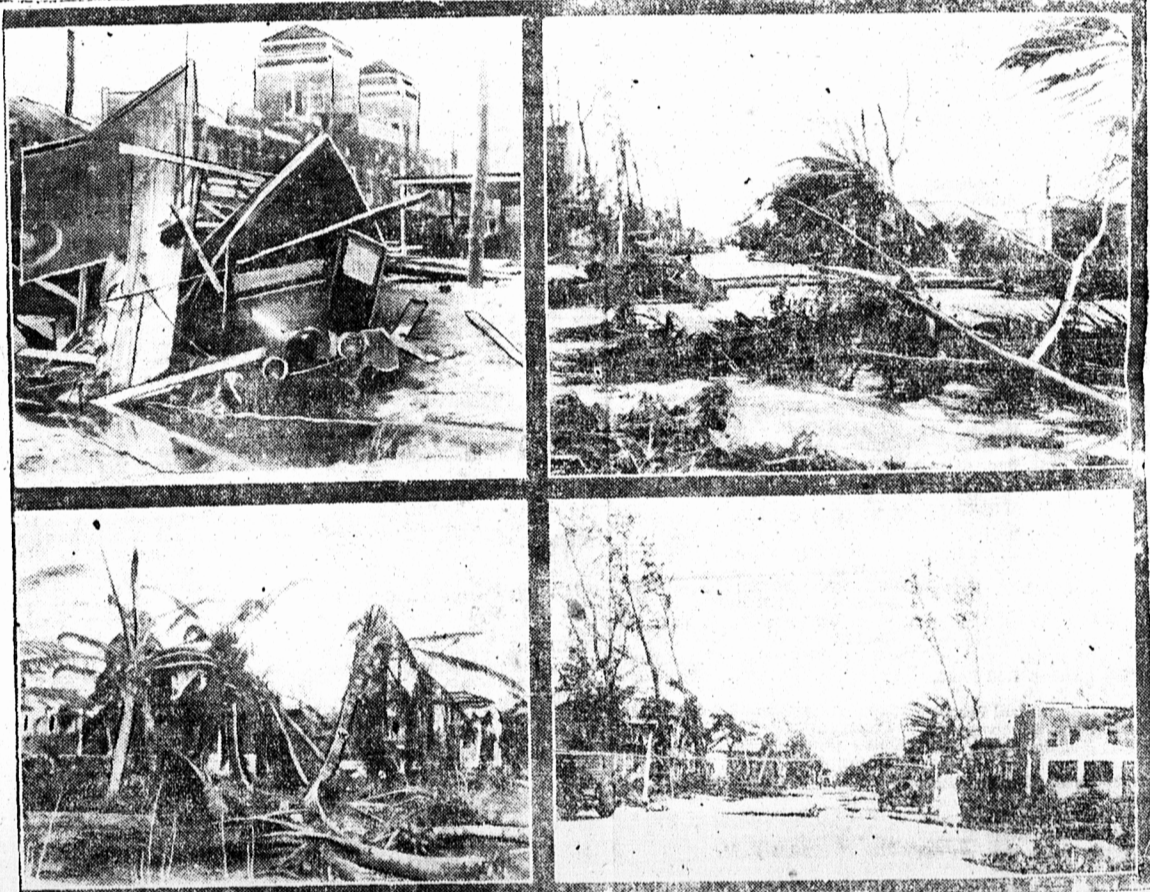
