A B C Auditor Has Finished

MR. A. R. CHAREST, OF BUREAU OF CIRCULATION, CHICAGO, COMPLETES WORK HERE

Mr. A. R. Charest, auditor of the Audit Bureau of Circulation, Chicago, who has been in the city since early in the week, left here Saturday to continue his work in Nova Scotia. While here Mr. Charest was auditing the circulation figures of The Charlottetown Guardian. A member of the Audit Bureau of Circulations in this Province. The A. B. C. as it is commonly known amongst newspapers and advertising men, is a mutual association of publishers, advertising agencies and the purchasers of advertising space. It was started 13 years ago by the publishers as a service for advertisers to provide them with data regarding the not paid circulation of the newspapers in which they might advertise their goods.

Up until that time circulation figures were based solely on the sworn affidavits of the publishers, which were not all to be depended upon, and those who might be unscrupulous would reap the benefit of padded circulation statements, while the honest publishers would suffer accordingly.

ARE VERIFIED

Under the A. B. C. arrangement the publishers' figures are verified by a personal audit of his books and circulation accounts, and thus the newspapers pay a large share of the expenses yearly for the protection of their advertisers. The newspapers never know when an auditor is coming to check up their books. He presents his credentials, takes complete charge of the circulation department, books and the staff of the paper is required to answer any questions which he may ask. Only paid circulation is counted and any subscriber owing more than six months' subscription immediately is dropped from the publishers' count of circulation.

1,000 MEMBERS

There are about 1,000 newspaper members of the Audit Bureau of Circulation in the United States and Canada, who are providing this safeguard to the advertisers of both countries.

Argentina and Chile as well have introduced contributory systems, while Norway and several of the States of the American Republic have adopted the non-contributory plan. So many civilized countries have adopted old age pension that Canada may be expected to recognize and apply the principle in some one of its many forms.

Sir Samuel Hoare, British Air Minister, has been talking to the Imperial Conference about his plans for extending communication by airships and aeroplanes throughout the Empire. He told of two airships now building in England and to be ready in a year's time which should, with a normal load of passengers and freight, be able to fly without refuelling in good weather 4,000 miles. From London to Canada in two and a half days, to India in five days, to Capetown in six days, to Australia in 11 days, are among the possibilities he set forth in the not distant future.

Concealing the Duncan report in Parliament meets and then postponing the date for the meeting, looks very like an intention to make the Maritimes wait another year for any benefits which the report recommends in their behalf. If the report had discredited our claims how quickly it would have been broadcasted to the uttermost parts of the Dominion. It would have had first place in the Liberal propaganda the next day after it was in possession of the Government.

There are about one hundred physicians on this island. Supposing each one issued a minimum of one hundred scripts a month; twelve hundred a year. Think of it! The amount of script money for this island alone would amount to \$120,000.00. ONE HUNDRED AND TWENTY THOUSAND DOLLARS A YEAR. That makes and gentlemen is the handsome contribution which eighty thousand people—men and children—make every year to the medical profession of Prince Edward Island.

There are doctors on this island home that will hail with delight the day when they are relieved from playing in this present day farce in which they are, practically forced to become hypocrites and liars in order that there be no break in the burlesque.

The bootlegger's golden opportunity has arrived. The ways of the world are open to him. The bootlegger sees the federal tax of \$14.00 on a gallon of rum. He sees \$9.50, a Provincial Government profit on a gallon of rum. He sees \$6.00 script money on a gallon of rum. He sees the original cost of a gallon of rum. We are told that Prince Edward Island is the clearance province for rum and whiskey for certain parts of the United States and Canada. I can well believe it. Water without and Scotch within make it a pretty good field for a base supply of the ardent. And we are told that liquor from this island finds its ways into Boston and Montreal and other centers of the United States and Canada, under the cover and camouflage of turnips and potatoes and oats.
