Words seem inadequate to express the intense sorrow and gloom which cast its shadow over the family of the late Alexander Graham, 23 Barton St., Somerville, Mass., son of the late Murdoch and Mary MacPherson Graham, Broadalbane, P. E. I., when news of his sudden passing came to them, on December 26th, 1947. He had spent Christmas Day quietly with friends, apparently in his usual health. In his anxiety and excitement over the sudden illness of his sister-in-law, Susan V. Conrad, R. N., who made her home with him, the two doctors whom he had summoned found that he had passed away at his telephone. The sorrow was great to those who shared his hospitality and friendship. Possessed of a quiet, unassuming, charming personality, he had all the qualities of a true se-

man. In early manhood he began work as a motorman with the Boston Elevated Railroad, retiring from service about four years ago, on the death of his wife, the former Ellinor Conrad, Lunenburg, N.S., with the unique record of never having a single accident. He was a loyal member of several Lodges, and a consistent member of Clarendon Hill Presbyterian Church, whose pastor, the Rev. Norman MacQueen officiated at 2 o'clock, December 29th, at the Wilson Chapel, 28 College Ave., Somerville, where the funeral service was held, attended by a large concourse of relatives and friends assembled to pay their final tributes of love and respect.
