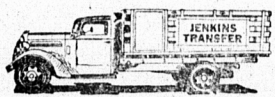

Craswell had passed to his eternal reward. Although he had passed his 84th year none looked upon him as being old, as he was young in spirit and being a sociable disposition had made many friends. He enjoyed a wide circle of friends and acquaintances. His genial disposition made him a welcome guest in any home he visited. A lover of children, the little ones were naturally attracted to him. Ever ready to forgive and forget an injury. Few things grieved him more than to witness the maintaining of unkind relations between members of the community. Broadminded to a marked degree though holding clear and strong convictions. He was always ready to help these in need and to give a word of cheer to the discouraged. He became a member in full communion with the Pleasant Valley Methodist Church many years ago, and has been an Elder in the same church for a number of years. 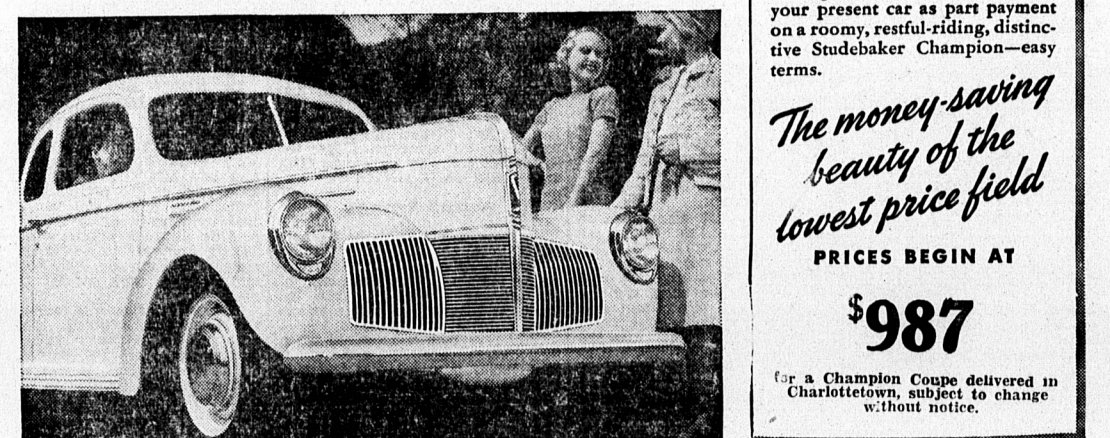

She became ill the latter part of September and entered the P. E. I. Hospital where she

underwent a serious operation, she improved slowly and was able to return home, later she went to the city for extra treatments which were of no avail. Returning home she gradually got weaker but with her courage and successful fighting she with a marvelous reserve amid considerable suffering, which she bravely tried to hide from her loved ones not giving up hope till near the last. She passed beyond the earthly scene on January 21st to a land as she sang with her father, to a land that is fairer than day. The night before her passing, she left a beautiful message for all her family including Randolph and Catherine. Mrs. Stevenson was born in Ashford, Kent, England twenty-six years ago, she graduated from Leslie High School at the age of thirteen. The family came from Leslie, Scotland, thirteen years ago and settled in Darlington. There remains to mourn her loss besides a sorrowing husband, Frank Stevenson of the C. N. R. her father and mother, Mr. and Mrs. David Rennie, her sister, Catherine, (Mrs. John Nicholson, Darlington), a nephew and a niece, Randolph and Catherine Nicholson and a favorite Aunt, Mrs. J. Adamson of Dunfermlie, Scotland. The funeral service was held at her late home on January 23rd, although the day was stormy a large number of neighbours and sympathetic friends from far and near gathered to pay solemn tributes to one who was greatly esteemed by all.

Dr. Thomas conducted the services and spoke comforting words basing his message on psalm 136 verse 22, "Cast Thy Burden on The Lord and He Shall Sustain Thee." She was known to all for her unselfishness for her consideration of others even when she was suffering herself she visited the sick and gave words of encouragement to them. It was her wish to be loved here. The hymns sung at her funeral were the hymns she sang before she passed away, "Shall We Gather At The River," "Anywhere With Jesus I Can Safely Go," "In The Sweet Bye and Bye," Mr. Robert Hill of Fredericton sang "Going Down The Valley."
