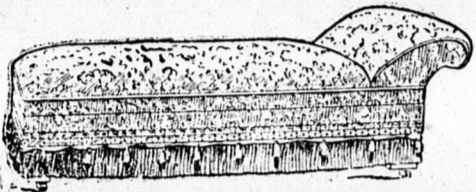

—Mill River oysters are selling in Alberton at two dollars and fifty cents per barrel. —Mrs. Ernest Hardy who has been spending the summer with her relatives George R. and Mrs. Hardy, Montrose, returned to Boston yesterday.

—Oats were selling in Alberton yesterday at forty cents per bushel but a drop of two cents is anticipated before the week ends. —Work on the New England church is progressing rapidly, the outer walls are being rushed up fast, being now completed to the height of the first story.

—Mrs. Chas. Wright, Bedeque, will be at home on Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday afternoon also Wednesday evening of next week. —Now that the evenings are getting long and cold why not arrange to spend a half hour of each evening at Happyland in Summerside. —William Pickard, Charlottetown, formerly in the employ of Godkin Bros, has taken a position in the Jewellery store of H. R. Crockett. —Rev. W. B. Crowell will preach in Freetown Hall tomorrow morning. Subject, "Who are the Pharisees?" If the weather permits an open air Gospel service will be held at Dunk River at two p.m. Service at seven in Summerside. The subject will be the fourth in the series on "The Love of God."

—There were 300 barrels of oysters, 250 bags of oats and one car of miscellaneous freight among the shipments by the Empress from Summerside yesterday. —The evening classes of the Union Commercial College, Summerside, will reopen for the fall and winter term on Monday, October 12, at seven o'clock. —There was very little change in the prices of produce at Summerside yesterday. Potatoes were moving freely at 20c., white oats 40c., black oats 40c., hay \$8 to \$9 per ton, eggs 17 cents, choice butter 21 to 23. —The shooting season has opened and with it comes to hand the first tidings of the "thrilling experiences" of a party consisting of a prominent contractor, a well known law student, a young photographer and a contractor's clerk, and also a young lady, all residents of Summerside, who left Holman's wharf in a small boat well supplied with arms, ammunition, etc., about 11 o'clock a few mornings ago for the shooting grounds back of Holman's Island. While beating up the harbor the boat grounded on the point of the Island bar. Efforts to float her were unsuccessful and with a falling tide the party were forced to remain there until about 3 o'clock in the afternoon, when they were rescued from their perilous position by the steamer Beedeque none the worse of their trip, with the exception of being somewhat wet. One of the party, who remained on the boat did not land until after 6 o'clock, having to wait until the tide rose sufficient to float the boat. A couple of members of the party after landing secured a gasoline boat and started to his aid until they met with a similar mishap which forced them to abandon their trip.

—Divine service tomorrow, St. Mary's (Presbyterian School room) morning at 11, evening at 7, Sunday School at 2.30, and at St. John's Church, St. Eleanors, afternoon at 3, Sunday School at 2. —Miss McLean of the nursing staff of the Boston City Hospital, who has been spending her vacation in the Province, left yesterday on return to Boston. She was accompanied by her mother, Mrs. George McLean of Sealestown who will spend the winter in Boston.

—From a Charleston, South Carolina paper the following item is taken. The Clyde steamship Comanche brought home yesterday four Charleston pastors and their families, returning from their vacation, the Rev. Dr. Veidler of the Huguenot Church; the Rev. Armand Miller, of St. John's Lutheran; the Rev. Dr. Fraser, of the Second Presbyterian Church, and the Rev. Clifton M. Grey, of the Unitarian Church. The Comanche sailed from New York with her two hundred passengers in spite of danger signals of the hurricane, and had a smooth trip of forty six hours. She carried seven clergymen, three of whom were on their way to Florida. Capt. Watson won golden opinions from all who sailed with him; (Dr. Fraser who is mentioned above spent his vacation at his old home in Alberton P. E. Island.)

—Several beautiful residences have been completed or are receiving the finishing touches during the past summer in Summerside. Among them mention might be made of that of Leslie Wright's Central Street, also that of John McKay's on Spring Street, both of which have been completed and are now occupied by the owners. The residence of George Godkin on Church Street and that of D. R. Morrison's on the corner of Church and Spring Streets are nearly completed and will make fine additions to Summerside.
