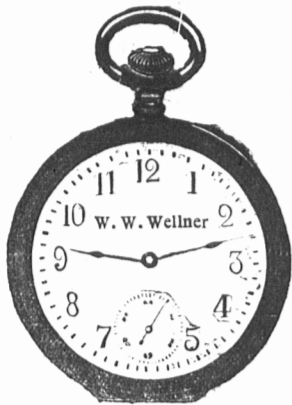

**DEATH CLAIMS ANOTHER VICTIM**

**Thomas J. Harris Dies Suddenly at his Office.**

Whither he had Gone Yesterday Morning—Found Dead by his Brother a few Minutes Later.

Another death that by its suddenness sent a shock throughout the city occurred yesterday morning in the Desbrisay Block at the Apothecaries Hall corner about ten o'clock. The citizen who was thus suddenly called to a Higher Sphere was Thomas J. Harris, one of the best known and highly respected gentlemen of Charlottetown. Mr. Harris has been engaged during the past few years in the insurance business and had his office with his brother, Architect W. C. Harris on the third floor of the new Desbrisay Block. Yesterday Mr. Harris left his home at Brighton as usual shortly before ten o'clock. The morning was a stormy one and the walk into the city in the cold wind was necessarily a hurried one. Mr. Harris called into the Examiner Office, apparently in his usual good health, as was his general custom and then proceeded to the Post Office. All this time he had no premonition of his approach to death. Leaving the Post Office he hurried across the street to the Desbrisay building and up the two flights of stairs to his own office. While passing through the second hallway he spoke to W. C. Cook of Cook's Photographic studio whose office is located at the head of the stairway. Nothing more was heard of Mr. Harris till he was found dead. About ten minutes later the brother of the deceased went to the office and found Mr. Harris lying on his side in the farther corner of the room. In his hand were the keys of the office and he had apparently fallen immediately after crossing the room to the radiator in the corner. Upon his forehead was a slight abrasure but the body bore no marks of a heavy fall.

The other occupants of the building including Dr. Strickland, dentist, the members of the staff of G. H. Cook's etc were immediately summoned but Dr. Strickland who made an examination found that life was extinct. Dr. S. R. Jenkins and Coroner H. D. Johnson who had been summoned by telephone came a few minutes later and the latter after hearing the facts decided that it was unnecessary to hold an inquest. The deceased had been suffering from heart disease for some time and his death from heart failure was undoubtedly due to his hurried walk in the snow and his subsequent rapid ascent of the two flights of stairs. The late Mr. Harris was the son of W. Critchlow Harris and was born in Liverpool in 1847. He emigrated to P. E. Island with his family in 1856 and for a time attended the Central Academy under Dr. Monk, and Prince of Wales College under Dr. Inglis. He later joined the business of G. D. and S. Davies, subsequently became a partner in the firm of George Davies & Co. and continued the business under the name of Harris and Stewart till a few years ago when he became P. E. I. Manager of the London and Lancashire Life Insurance Co. and the Maryland Casualty Co. In 1879 he married Jessie Henrichs, daughter of the late James D. Haszard. He leaves also two sons Charles, lay reader at Georgetown, and James in the office of Hyndman & Co. and one daughter Doral. There are also three brothers Robert Harris, C. M. G. of Montreal, William Critchlow, architect, of this city and Rev. E. A. Harris, rector at Mahone Bay. N. S. two sisters, Miss Harris, Vice-Principal of Prince S. School and Mrs. W. L. Cotton.

**'T WAS ACCIDENTAL DEATH.**

HALIFAX, N. S. Jan. 29.—Daniel Gorman, a 17 year old boy, was today shot by his brother Arthur, aged 19, and killed instantly. The two were in a boat shooting wild ducks at the Eastern Passage, near this city, where they belong. The gun went off accidentally, and the contents were discharged point blank into the younger brother's breast. A coroner's inquest was held and a verdict of accidental death rendered.
