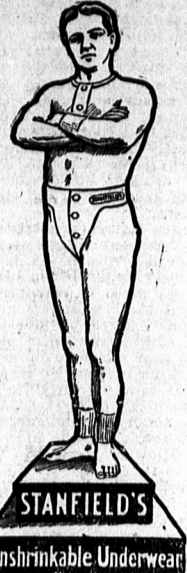

A public meeting was held at Wellington recently for the purpose of considering the question of fishing quahaugs. About fifty persons interested in the fishery were present, and all agreed that fishing quahaugs does not injure the growth of the oysters. John Taylor, a practical fisherman, condemned the idea of leasing oyster areas in Grand River to private individuals. At the close a resolution was passed, to be forwarded to James Richards and Mr Mathieson asking the Government for one month's fishing. The meeting then adjourned.

At a meeting of the Ministerial Association at Montreal on Monday Rev. Dr. Gordon of the First Baptist church, (formerly pastor of the Baptist Church in this City) pointed out that among the items of the program for the Quebec tercentenary celebration was the celebration of high mass on the plains of Abraham on Sunday, August 26. Should this part of the program, said Mr. Gordon, be intended as an event of purely local import there would be no objection, but if it was a prevailing sentiment that a demonstration, supposed to be of national character, ought not to bear the stamp of any particular denomination, considering that the population of the dominion was made up of various creeds and races. The celebration of mass on such an occasion as an integral part of a national demonstration, Dr. Gordon declared, did not meet the approval of a large number of Protestants, particularly Baptists and Presbyterians, although the celebration of high mass as a local event would give rise to no objection whatever. The matter was left over for consideration.
