**ANNUAL MEETING**—The annual meeting of the rate-payers of the Grand Tracadie School took place on June 15th. Mr. Donald McDougall was elected trustee. Mr. Wm. A. McDonald retired. Supplement voted, \$35; for contingent expenses, \$55. The teacher, Mr. C. J. McLean, was re-engaged.

**YOUNG PRINCE**—A telegram received in the city yesterday announces the birth of a son, on June 28th, to the Prince and Princess Rospihlisa. The Prince and Princess, it will be remembered, left here a few weeks ago, the former on return to Italy to rejoin his army.

**IMPROVEMENTS**—Some changes are being made in the Charlottetown Post Office. The stamp vendor's office is to be removed from its present situation to give additional room for the clerks in their work, and a stamp office is to be built in the lobby adjacent to the Post Master's office. Mr. W. W. Harper has the contract of the work.

**SACRAMENT**—Sacrament of the Lord's Supper will be dispensed in St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church, Cardigan, on the Sabbath Day, July 4th. Preparatory services at Lorne Valley on Thursday and Friday at 10.30 a. m. Rev. D. McLean will preach both in Gaelic and English. Services at Cardigan at 2.30 p. m. Saturday. Rev. Mr. Greenleaf, of Georgetown, will preach.

**THE A. W. PERRY**—On Wednesday afternoon the wrecked Plant liner A. W. Perry broke in two, slipped off the rocks at Chebucto Head into deep water and on Thursday there was nothing of her visible above the surface of the water. The sea was so rough that craft could not approach near the scene. Excepting some loose hemp there was no wrecked material to be seen about the beach or rocks.

**PATRIOTIC MEETING FOR YORK**—A patriotic meeting will be held in the Hall York on Wednesday night when the band of the 82nd Regiment will be present and discourse music. Addresses will be delivered by His Honor Judge Haszard, Canon Simpson, Rev. Dr. Fullerton and other local speakers. Colonel Crockett will preside, and a musical programme will be given.

**AT 9 O'CLOCK, GO**—At a meeting of the Retail Merchants Association held last night it was decided not to open the stores until 9 o'clock in order to give all customers a fair start for dollar bargains on Dollar Day. The Guardian understands that most elaborate preparations have been made by all merchants and Bargain Day promises to be the biggest shopping day in the history of the province. It is understood that no goods will be sent out on approbation as this would be impossible owing to the rush of trade.

**FURTHER PARTICULARS**—The Cheese Board held its first meeting in the city on Friday, Vice-President Walter Simpson in the chair. A letter was read from Mr. J. B. Wilson, secretary of Brookville Cheese Board, offering to furnish messages at the same rate as last year. Auditor Geo. Brown reported that he found the accounts correct, with a balance on hand of \$644. The officers for the current year were then chosen: President, Walter Simpson, Bay View; Vice-President, Hugh McMillan, New Haven; Secy-Treas. and Salesman, Robt. Jenkins, Mt. Albion; Auditor, Geo. Brown, New Glasgow; Official Weighers, Robt. H. Jenkins, city, and Alex. Campbell, Summerside. Meetings will be held on Friday at 1.30 p. m. every two weeks, business meeting at 1.15. The dates are: July 9th and 23rd, August 6th and 20th, September 3rd and 17th, October 1st, 15th and 29th. Factories boarding cheese: Stanley, 100; New Glasgow, 170; Union, 100 (hats); Cornwall, 50; Kensington, 250; Hazelbrook, 80 (hats); Mr. Spillet secured the output of Stanley and Cornwall at 15.6c. On motion it was agreed that the Board fee be the same as last year.
